

#### EGG CASES ARE NOW

**IN SHORT SUPPLY**  
Anticipating record egg production this fall, the Dominion Department of Agriculture has warned dealers of the need to order egg cases immediately. "With this year's hatchings earlier than usual, and 19 per cent above those of 1945, Canadian egg production beginning this fall may reach an all-time high," the Department said.

To ensure sufficient containers for the hundreds of millions of eggs expected to be produced this fall and winter, the Department recommended that all shippers of eggs in carton quantities order case shocks fully six months in advance so that sufficient wood may be obtained for their manufacture.
