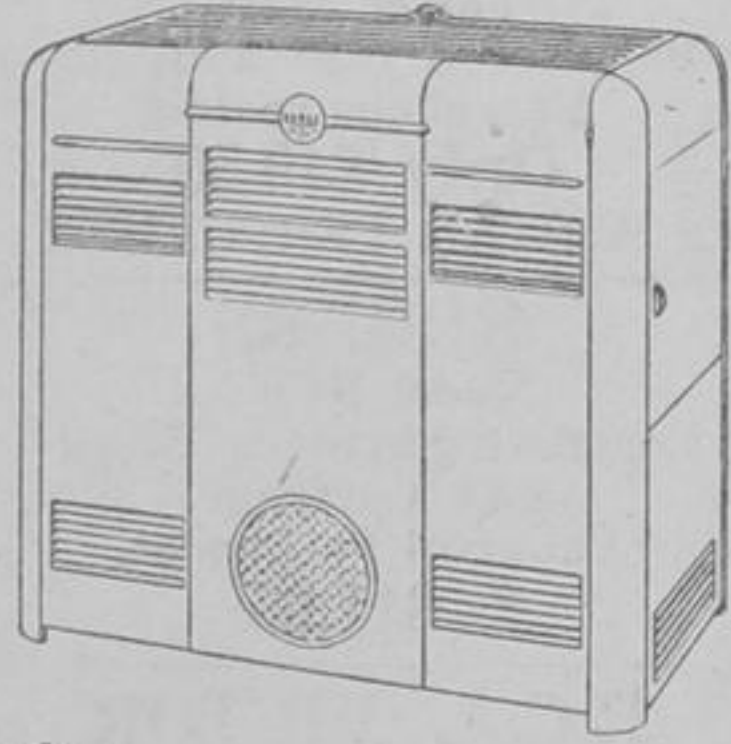

### CANADA SENDS HORSEMEAT TO HUNGRY EUROPE

The Canadian Commercial Corporation, acting on behalf of UNRRA, had sent 10,000,000 lbs. of canned horsemeat in gray to Poland and Italy by the end of 1946.

The canned horsemeat is part of Canada's contribution toward feeding hungry Europe and an additional 16,500,000 lbs. of it will be sent overseas early this year.

All of this UNRRA horsemeat is being tinned at Swift Current, Sask. Total cost of the order, which is being paid partly out of Canada's cash gifts to UNRRA and partly out of UNRRA free funds, will be \$4,098,000.

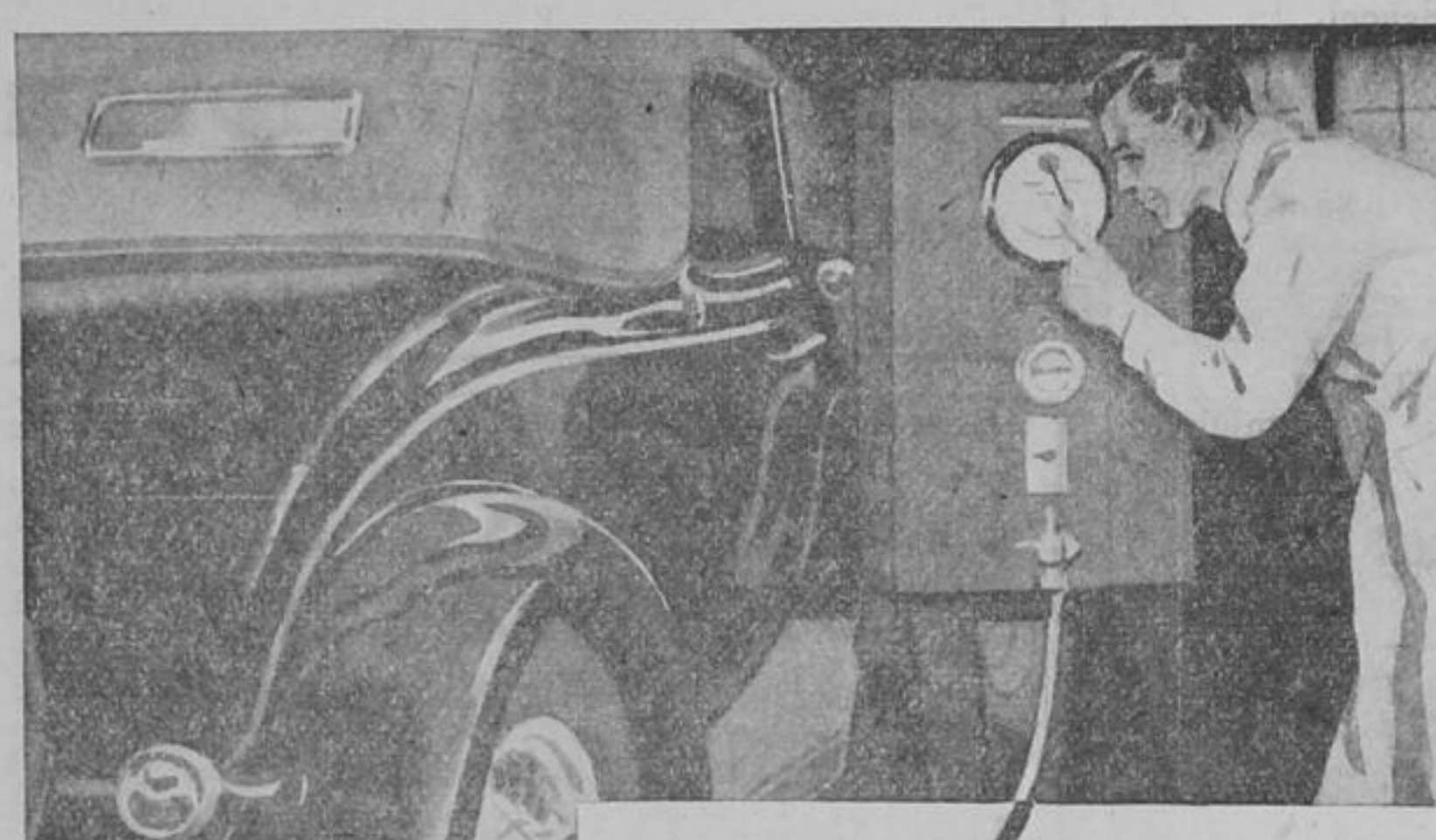
