VOLUNTARY RELIEF

TOTALLED \$81,000,000
Revenue Minister McCann, who also is Minister of National War Services, reports that Canadians voluntarily contributed supplies valued at \$81,000,000 to war relief from 1939 to the end of 1946. Records of the Voluntary Relief Division are being transferred to the Health Department. At present more than \$1,000,000 worth of foods and supplies a month still is being sent abroad by voluntary workers.

"These contributions," Mr. McCann said, "were over and above the commitments by the Canadian Government to the United Kingdom and other countries and were made by the people of Canada through their own initiative and effort. It is a truly magnificent record, and one of which every Canadian may be proud."
