**FURTHER PRICE DECONTROL**

The Wartime Prices and Trade Board has announced the removal of price ceilings on six classes of goods, now effective. Controls have been removed from bakery products of which soft wheat flour is a primary or principal ingredient. These include cakes, pies and pastries. Controls have also been removed on tea, coffee, leather garments other than gloves, fertilizers and gopher poison. At the same time the Board announced new ceiling prices on soft wheat flour at \$1.30 per barrel above each seller's basic period price and an increase of 3/4 cents per pound in the manufacturer's selling prices of all biscuits.

The new ceilings on soft wheat flour reflect the adjustment in winter wheat prices announced by the Minister of Finance on June 26, and the adjustment on biscuits covers the increase in the soft wheat flour prices. However, since other baker products in which winter wheat flour is a principal ingredient are of great variety, kinds and sizes it has been decided to de-control these commodities rather than attempt the heavy administrative burden of working out new ceiling prices for each and every item.
