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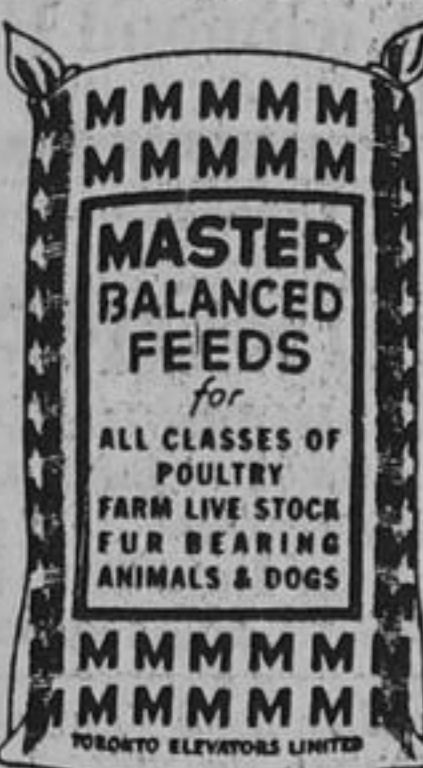
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# King City District News

#### Water Service Soon Available

With the establishment of water mains in King City water-area, which is gaining headway, applications to have intakes into homes or public buildings will be received. It has been pointed out by several taxpayers that information regarding cost, procedure, service, maintenance should be and will be given to applicants. Advice of fully qualified engineers reliable to the point of what is best for the majority can be reasonably expected.

The assessment of water area stands at \$146,000 on which is based the 21.2 mill tax rate for fire protection service. Around 105 households

may make application, of which 65 is presently considered the number making applications for the service for domestic use. This number may increase upon further survey. Indications are said to point to increased sale of building lots and construction of new homes, which would help to spread the \$46,000 debenture costs over more taxpayers, as total assessment rises.

They are more or less bewildered by Canadian generosity, and keenly appreciate the unflinching interest displayed toward the people of Britain. It is difficult, said the speaker, for the British

housewife to find enough food to feed her growing boys.

Mrs. A. F. Jarvis outlined the course in public speaking offered by the District W.I. last fall, and attended by herself and Mrs. E. Kyle. Using W.I. members, Mrs. Jarvis demonstrated the forms of platform manner, and the various requirements for effective expression.
