Yes, more food is available for the world today when its need is desperate, because Canadian farmers with only a two-thirds increase in numbers over 1900, are growing 41/2 times as much grain, producing 21/2 times as much milk, feeding twice as many cattle and 21/2 times as many hogs, raising 5 times as many chickens; because they are providing food for 21/2 times as many people in Canada and exporting 30 times as much wheat and 10 times as much flour.

Farmers are doing it because individually they produce more today than in 1900, but it means hard work. And there is no harder working group of people in the world than the Canadian farmers. But hard work alone would not be enough to accomplish such results. They do it by a combination of hard work and modern machinery.
