A number of gardens in Lowell, Mass., and vicinity were open to the public during this particular week and the visitors saw the very latest in new iris development. Other gardens of professional growers were in Concord, New Hampshire. Mrs. Little and Marion afforded themselves of the opportunity given to some of the visitors to wander through some of the old Colonial styled homes furnished throughout with beautiful antique furniture while Mr. Little was feasting on the subtle colors of some of the new iris specimens. Places of historic interest added to the pleasure of the trip. The Grotton Inn about ten miles out of Lowell was one of their stopping places. The late President Roosevelt attended school here as a boy. While there they had the pleasure of being entertained by the parents of Dr. Helen Hogg, Lowell being her home town. The Wayside Inn, Sudbury, Mass., was another place surrounded with a great deal of interest and where the travellers stayed over night along their journey. It was the home of Longfellow and was built in 1683. It was restored and kept up by the Ford Foundation Fund and is furnished with authentic early Colonial furnishings. Another place of interest visited was Ralph Waldo Emerson's house in Concord, Mas. These together with the breathtaking mountain scenery on the homeward drive through the Adirondacks concluded a memorable vacation trip.
