Broadcast Heard With Keen Interest

The radio drama "Portrait of a Woman" broadcast over the C.B.C. Dominion network last Monday evening (June 28) struck chords of community pride because it was written and directed by Alan King, who lives near Thornhill, and starred Alice Hill of Richmond Hill in the title role.

For Mrs. Owen Classey of Thornhill the play held an additional interest. As she sat listening to Miss Hill's charming portrayal of Elizabeth Linley, the 18th century concert soprano, who later became the wife of Richard Brinsley Sheridan, playwright and politician, she had but to stretch out her hand to touch a memento of the real heroine's family. Standing in her bookcase is a tall, slim, black-bound volume compiled by W. Linley, brother of the talented Elizabeth, and signed on the frontispiece with his initials. Published more than one hundred and twenty years ago, the time yellowed pages contain music for songs from Shakespeare, beautifully printed from copper plates. Included in the collection are some compositions by Wm. Linley and his brother, Thomas, who were amateur musicians. The book is dedicated to 'the old Drury Club, a social circle around the shrine of Shakespeare.' Mrs. Classey discovered it in an old London, England, book stall some years ago.
