ARTIFICIAL LAKE LOCATED NEAR RICHMOND HILL

Lots of Fish But No Fishing

Pity the poor fish! He just hasn't any privacy any more. That is the conclusion reached by experts of the ious species of fish under controlled conditions near here. The studies take place in one of the world's strangest artificial lakes at the experimental station of the department in Honeypot, Concession 3, Vaughan, near Richmond Hill.

The "Lake" is a 20-foot steel drum, eight feet in diameter and by a special arrangement of pipes can be layered off in respect to water temperature, pressure and other conditions. It is the only lake of its kind in North America and according to Dr. F. E. J. Fry, assistant professor of zoology at the University of Toronto and closely associated with fisheries research, a season's entire cycle of fish conditions can be reproduced.
