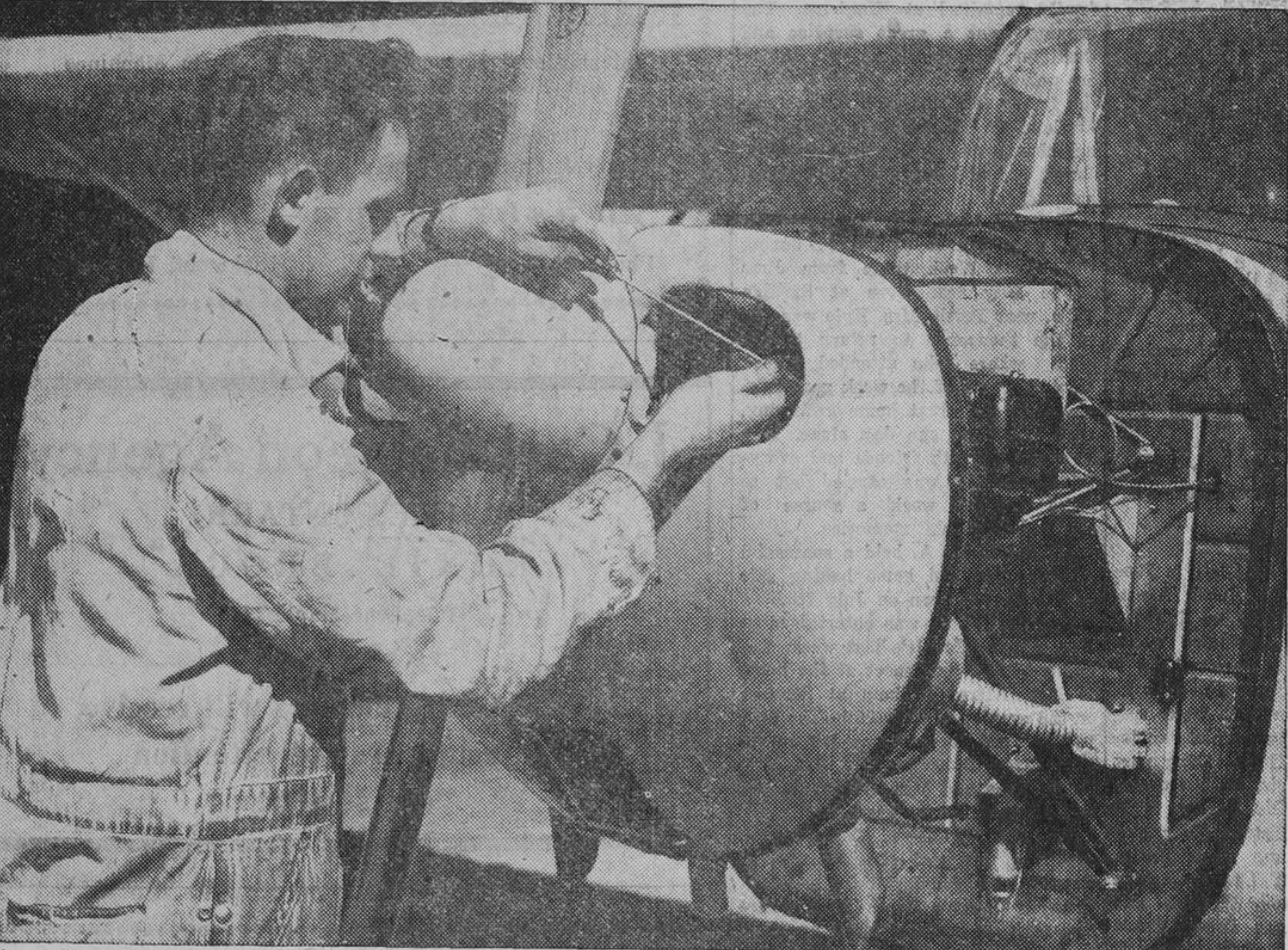

LEARNING AERO ENGINE AND AIRFRAME MECHANICS
