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General News and Views

An area of approximately 1,000 acres in the vicinity of Vandorf may shortly become a Crown game reserve, if the request of the twp. council of Whitechurch is acted on by the department of game and fisheries. At a recent meeting of the sporting element in the municipality the matter of preserving the game in the twp. was under discussion and Fred van Nostrand submitted a resolution which carried the meeting and which was sent on to the twp. council to act on.

A building boom is hitting its peak in Carleton Place this year, according to figures released by the township building inspector's office. In comparison with 1947, building permit figures for the corresponding period of 1948 from January to the end of May this year have more than doubled the previous year's housing expansion in the township.

At this season with the lessons we have recently learned from the great forest fires in our own Province, a recent bulletin issued by the Industrial Accident Prevention Association is especially apt. The advice "Chaperon your cigarettes — don't let them go out alone!" is good whether one is at home, at work or at play.

Peel County sportsmen, some 500 of them have gone into business — an unusual enterprise from which they expect not to get one cent. All members of the Peel Game and Fish Protective Association, they have invested money, time and labor in a plant that will provide 4,000 pheasants for the fall hunting season. Using converted airport buildings from Dunnville, they have established a comfortable hatchery in which 120 hen pheasants are each laying eggs at the rate of one a day. The incubator chicks have thrived and they will be ready for release in time for the open season.

A bulletin issued this month to over 6,000 industries throughout Ontario by the Industrial Accident Prevention Association mentions the fact that "Good manners and good driving go together". The bulletin points out that it isn't manners to hog the centre of the road and force somebody to pass on your right which is the wrong side for passing nor is it good manners to jump the amber light.

The Township of Whitechurch will share in the monies received for fines imposed in that municipality under the Ontario Liquor Act, it was learned at the regular meeting of the municipal council this week. Heretofore the fines went to the province, and the council under Reeve L. P. Evans took steps to enact the necessary bylaw that would enable the township to collect a share since their officers undertake to carry out the provisions of the Liquor Control Act.

Past history and statistics are contrary to an opinion expressed in some quarters that immigration tends to lower wages, according to the Hon. Humphrey Mitchell, Minister of Labour. During the thirteen-year period from 1900 to 1913, he said yesterday, Canada experienced the greatest influx of immigrants in her history. Immigration rose from a normal inflow of 50,000 a year at the beginning of the century to over 400,000 in the fiscal year 1912-1913. Statistics show that a general increase in wages of between forty and forty-five per cent took place during this period. This shows the fallacy of the belief that immigration depresses wages, Mr. Mitchell pointed out.

Although the Ontario potato crop in general is now progressing favourably, those fine, healthy, luxurious green plants which now show much promise of good yields may be a disappointment, unless they are given protection against injury from flea beetles and leaf hoppers, says R. E. Goodin, fieldman for the Ontario Department of Agriculture. Potato growers are therefore warned to be on guard against these two destructive insects.

Women's Institutes of Ontario are this summer being visited by prominent officials of the Federated Women's Institutes of England and Wales. One of the outstanding visitors has been Lady Howarth, of the Chester Federation of Women's Institutes, England, who after an extensive tour of Ontario Institutes, has gone to the United States to visit similar organizations there.

Another important visitor, now in Ontario, is Mrs. Ida Braine, Hertfordshire W. I., England, executive member and a volunteer organizer of Women's Institutes in England. Mrs. Braine has already visited Women's Institutes in Simcoe and York Counties, and after completing her tour, she will sail for England on September 25.

Mrs. Kerr gave a most appropriate reading entitled "The Housewife's Lament" and Mrs. C. Beynon, the convener, spoke briefly on the topic.

Using as an introduction the Foreword in Mrs. Aitkin's Cook Book, she stressed the necessity of keeping pace with new discoveries made in nutrition with improved methods and new ideas. The study of food is intensely interesting and remunerative.

The pressure cooker was demonstrated by Mrs. M. Beynon and Mrs. Chalk. Mrs. Beynon explained the advantages of cooking meat and vegetables by this method. Mrs. Chalk explained canning by the pressure method and displayed samples of fruit, vegetables and chicken which she had done. Though the shut-off in the hydro power caused much delay and inconvenience, the demonstration was conducted in a most commendable manner. It was decided that our Branch would send regular gift parcels to a worthy veteran in Christie St. hospital. Mrs. Davis kindly consented to make the necessary inquiry and to deliver the first parcel.

 "Yours truly."

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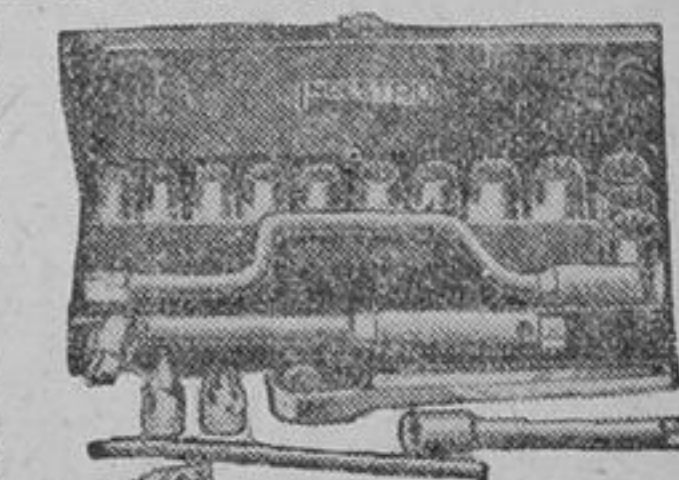
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
