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RADIALS SHOULD BE LAST NOT FIRST, TO SUFFER POWER CUT

The announcement of the North Yonge Radial Commission that there is to be a suspension in the Yonge Street Radial service and a substitution of a bus service has been met with considerable misgiving in the North Yonge Street district.

We agree with those who feel strongly that the suspension of the radial service should have been one of the last resorts in a hydro saving program, not one of the first.

There has been so much evidence in recent years that there are interests for varying reasons most anxious to get rid of the radial line and substitute a bus service, that we cannot blame many who think they scent a nigger in the woodpile in the present situation.

Members of all municipal councils of the four participating municipalities are meeting to-night to consider the whole matter and we are confident they will take steps to safeguard the transportation interests and rights of the people of the North Yonge Street district.

We suggest that in the best interests of the district that, instead of suspending the radial car service the joint meeting of councils decide to suspend the suspension order.

A transportation system such as the North Yonge Radials renders a vital service to a large community. As such it should be one of the very last services to be interfered with in a Hydro saving program. Such action should be taken only as a last resort after every other possible avenue of saving had been exhausted.

Our further suggestion is that the T.T.C. dispose of the busses reportedly purchased for operation on North Yonge Street and then they would be spared the periodical temptation to put them in operation.
