The regular monthly meeting of the trustees of this village was held in Victoria Hall on Tuesday evening, October 26th. It would seem from Mr. Carver's explanation that while the village may not be ready for incorporation at this time, such incorporation may be a good thing to look for in the future. Certain angles must be investigated first, of course, such as grants given by the department of education and the department of highways but more information will be available at the next meeting.
