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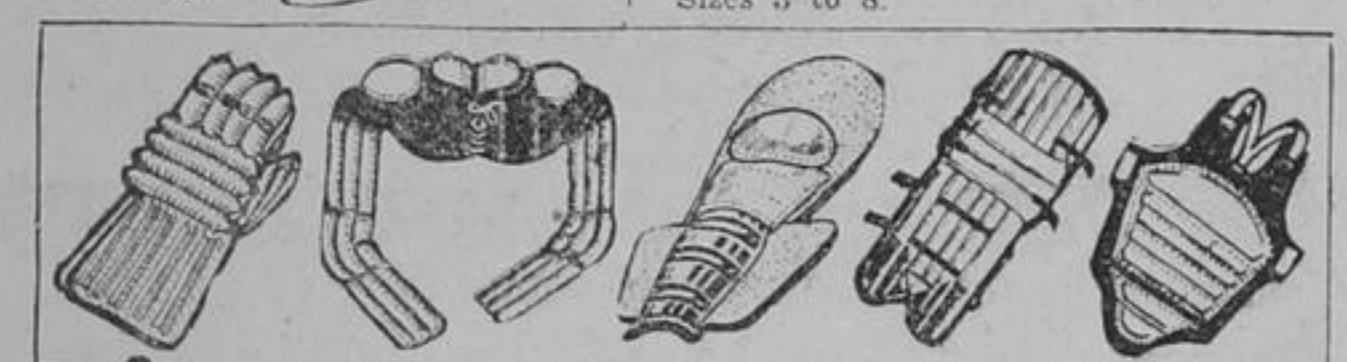
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## King City District News

### Clear, Clear Water

An abundant supply of sparkling, clear, exhilarating water flows through mains in King village, and most dwellings are now connected with the supply found just north of the town on the Dr. Barrie farm. Thompson and Hawkins, Aurora, carried out the contract made with them by King township council to install waterworks system adequate for domestic and fire protection service. James Wall, Oak Ridges, contracted for by village commissioners to install connecting pipes to households and business places. The era is now past where well users need haul pails of water by hand, many of whom were inconvenienced for years by lack of adequate village water supply. As time went on more and more were forced to abandon dried out wells, and for many water was at premium, for most of the year. New homes have been built here on the strength of suitable water supply, and the inducement is already proving a good investment. The water pressure is very high; it tastes very satisfactory, and is as clear as could be found anywhere, and some say there is a very small percentage of lime content. Soaps appear to dissolve comparatively easily.

So far so good, but what about the hazard of fires. While the supply would greatly facilitate any fire fighting equipment called in here it would appear reasonable according to suggestions by several citizens, that King village be equipped with several hundred feet of hose, for emergency use, for it does take some time for either Aurora or Maple fire brigade to reach the village. It would be a well advised precaution and is something for consideration were village commissioners disposed to ask for public opinion.

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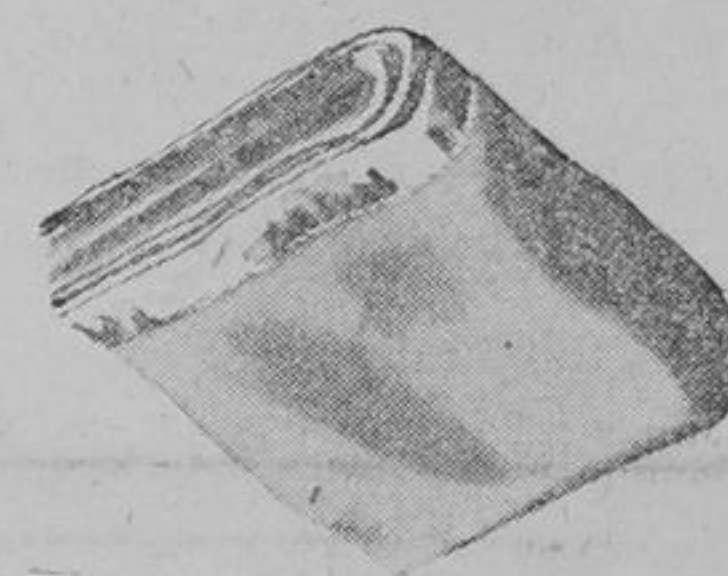
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
