Dear Sir:—

I am writing this letter with hopes that the people of the village will all read it and understand the position that Mr. Cecil Mabey is up against in his position as to looking after our local arena.

There is not a better man for the job in the whole of the village but to my mind he is being over-loaded with very little help, even from his own council. It is put up to him to see that the rink is in use for the winter months and he has the job of organizing the times and hours that are to be used by the different clubs and organizations. When the weather is mild and he cannot have ice, he has people phone him night and day as to why there isn't ice and what's the matter with him. Even his family suffer abuse when answering the phone. He has one man to work with him who is Mr. Muir. This man not only has to look after the cleanliness of the arena but also the flooding, the heating, the supervision of men with axes and others are to go on the ice and to come off. He works all night flooding a good many nights as well as in the day time and in the evening also. This is not counting the outside rink which he has to clear of snow and flood as well. I know that a great many of you don't stop and consider just how many are looking after the arena and as to how the ice is flooded, etc. but I think that if you do you will agree with me that these men have a great deal on their shoulders. Mr. Mabey also has his own work to be done.

This week, in fact tonight at the Municipal Hall, Mr. Mabey is calling a public meeting with regards to artificial ice, so why not come out yourselves and express your view points on the subject which to my mind is the biggest thing the village has brought up and will need the co-operation of all its citizens.

Before closing I would like to say that we all owe Mr. Mabey a vote of thanks for the work he is doing for the village and for the interest that he has taken in everything that he has done.
