OBITUARY

LATE FRED SCHELKE
Fred Schelke, veteran horse trainer, owner and sportsman of Gormley, died in St. Michael's Hospital last Friday. Associated with horse racing the late Mr. Schelke was widely known in recent years as the breeder, owner and trainer of the famed Shepperton, whose string of impressive victories brought many honors to the blue with white sash silks of the Gormley stable.

Schelke was born at Brooksbury, Indiana, and while quite young associated himself with horse racing. Eventually trained for the late Capt. P. M. Walker, a job which brought him to Woodbine for the first time.

Later, Schelke trained for J. K. L. Ross, H. Grabner of Chicago, for whom he conditioned Chicago, which he considered the fastest horse he ever handled. Later he trained for the late H. C. Hatch and for Henry Dicks and R. W. R. Cowie.

Surviving are his widow, the former Mabel Costello, and a daughter, Mary. Funeral services were held Monday at 10 o'clock in St. Cecilia's Roman Catholic church.

New Trustee Elected to Public School Board

Mr. H. C. Rogers of Thornbank Rd. was unanimously elected Trustee at a meeting called by the Board of Trustees of Thornhill Public School and held in the school on Monday evening, January 31st. Approximately 20 ratepayers were present. Mr. Rogers replaces Mr. Ronald Penn who resigned owing to the fact that he has purchased property outside the district and will be moving within a couple of months. Mr. Penn was chairman of the board.

Mr. Rowett, school inspector, was present at the meeting to outline the Department of Education's stand with regard to the building of a school in the south end of Thornhill to accommodate the children in that area; Mr. Deacon, architect, outlined the estimated costs in comparison to an addition to Thornhill Public School; and Mr. R. Fenn gave a resume of the program as laid down by the Board of Trustees, who recommended the school in the south end. The new school will be a four-room project and the approximate cost will be \$10,000. According to a definite recent survey, in five year's time there will be 250 children going to school in schools in the district, not taking into consideration any percentage increase, or in other words, minus a possible increase in population as new homes are built.

Harriet Alice Noobe, wife of Rev. N. H. Noble, died suddenly at St. James Rectory, Careton East, on Wednesday, January 26th. Mrs. Noobe had many friends in this district where she had lived for a number of years while her husband was rector at Trinity Anglican Church. She took a keen interest in church affairs, and was a life member of the Women's Association. Surviving besides her husband are three sons, Winifred T. of Willowdale, Rev. C. E. Sault Ste. THE FIRST MOVIE THEATRE

The first motion picture theatre in the world was a converted shoe store located on Broadway, New York. It was called the Kinetoscope Parlour and was opened on April 14, 1894. The store was lined with Thomas A. Edison's kinetoscope machines which permitted one person at a time to view the picture through a peephole. These first pictures ran for about fifteen seconds each and showed nothing more than a man sneezing, a girl dancing and Annie Oakley firing a gun. Thomas Lombard was the proprietor of this first theatre — and he didn't intend to open up until the following Monday, but curious crowds gathered outside his store front and he needed money for dinner, so he opened up ahead of time and took in \$120 the first night. The motion picture industry was started.
