TRAFFIC LIGHTS TO BE IMPROVED

 that the arena was making a good showing despite poor weather conditions for ice-making.

Arena chairman, Councillor Mabley said that, in view of the opinions expressed verbally by citizens and in the local press, he would like to point out that he had held Friday night open at the arena for use by interested parties. However, in mid-December, no local request having been made, he leased that night to other parties. Since then, there has been criticism that sufficient nights were not held.

When Council declared that, public opinion to the contrary, they were fully 100% behind Mr. Mabley in his operation of the arena affairs, the Councillor replied that he had never found the council wanting when he needed support and declared Council had never let him down in this respect. Council felt that instead of accusing the Council of lack of co-operation, the citizens should co-operate more fully with Councillor Mabley and the Council in the conduct of the arena.

The Community Hall

Considerable discussion brought the Community Hall into the limelight. Councillor Taylor said he felt that this Hall should not be a responsibility on Council. If such were to happen here might be additional financial burden placed on the taxpayers. This, he emphatically declared, should not happen and would not if he could prevent it. He wants to know if the Hall Committee had authority to go ahead and build the hall without further reports to Council.

It was pointed out that at present there is \$18,000 in cash with a provincial grant of \$5,000 to come when the hall is ready for use. With financial aid from the Lions' Club and perhaps other organizations, it was expected that the total now available would be at least \$24,000. Some councillors felt this was not enough to warrant an immediate start.

When Councillor Taylor asked about the cost of maintaining the completed hall, he was informed that the provincial government would pay part of this cost and also that for certain leadership, etc. Also it is expected assistance would be forthcoming from interested fraternal and other organizations for this purpose.

Councillor Tomlin said the Committee was responsible to Council and that there is no reason why the Hall would be a liability as the Hall will not be handed over to the municipality until free of debt.

The committee was appointed under the provincial by-laws governing such halls entitled to provincial aid.

Councillor Middleton, who with Councillor Mabley, is on the Committee reported he had been assured they would not start building until enough money is raised.

Members were unanimous in the opinion that the Hall must not be a financial liability to taxpayers.

Fails To Turn Up

Several representatives of church and ladies' organizations and others were disappointed when a representative of the Parcel Service of the United Emergency Fund to Britain failed to turn up at 7:30 p.m. as had been arranged and confirmed. The citizens waited until 8:30 p.m., in hopes of getting additional information regarding this service.

Mrs. P. C. Hill pointed out that she had looked after the former Personal Parcel Service, under which parcels to Great Britain were sent under reduced postage costs. This service has been taken over by UEFB and they were present to find out if the arrangements were to be similar to that in the past and to get answers to other questions arising from the transfer.

It was suggested that the village arrange a central depot for receiving parcels and arrange for them to be transported to the Toronto depot. Although Council members felt they could look after such things as transportation, pending further information no definite action was taken.

The Clerk was instructed to write the person who had indicated his intention of attending the Council meeting for this purpose, to find out what was wrong and endeavor to arrange another meeting in the near future.

Council decided to send a letter of felicitations to F. Hoover on his retirement as manager of the local branch of the Canadian Bank of Commerce.
