## H. H. Newsome Interred at King

A resident of King for the past five years, Mr. Henry H. Newsome passed away on Monday, February 28, at York County Hospital, Newmarket where he had been ill for a few days suffering from an acute attack of the shingles. Mr. Newsome had been in poor health for a couple of years or more but had managed to look after the home. He was highly respected in the community and made many friends among the neighbours and villagers. Mr. Newsome was a member of King Baptist church and was a regular attendant of King United Church adult Bible Class. Deceased was born 69 years ago at Hammer-smith, London, coming to Canada 37 years ago to settle at Kew Beach, Toronto. For five years he was employed with Gillard's Express, and for 24 years was a trusted employee of the City Dairy, for which he was one of the earliest drivers. He was an original member of Borden's Goldenest choir and was connected with the I.O.O.F. for 30 years. He was a former secretary of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew's Society, Toronto and while in Toronto was a member of the Anglican faith. In 1931 his wife the former Louise Ann Piper passed away, and later he married Dorothy Agnes Johnston who survives him. Also surviving is a son, Herbert Newsome, a daughter, Bernice Newsome, both of Toronto, and a step-son, William G. Taylor of Windsor. The funeral service was held from the late residence on Wednesday and was conducted by Rev. W. E. Smalley, assisted by Rev. M. R. Jenkinson. There were many floral tributes from neighbours, church friends and many others. Interment was made in King cemetery.
