


#### TEAM WORK PAYS DIVIDENDS

When it became necessary through the growth of the community to increase the Sunday School rooms in one of the Richmond Hill churches, the suggestion was made that expenses could be cut if the members of the congregation, in so far as was possible, would turn out and help in the excavation and construction work. Last week, after completing their own working day, young and old men volunteered and under the direction of the more experienced rolled up their sleeves to dig and shovel with the endurance of any labourer.

Their endurance, in fact, was and will be greater, for they have a special interest in the job and a wish to see its accomplishment. Their enthusiasm is reminiscent of the days of the early settlers, when neighbour helped neighbour clear land and build - dropping his own work to do so. Regardless of any personal desire to assist it was to the interest of the early pioneer to co-operate.
