

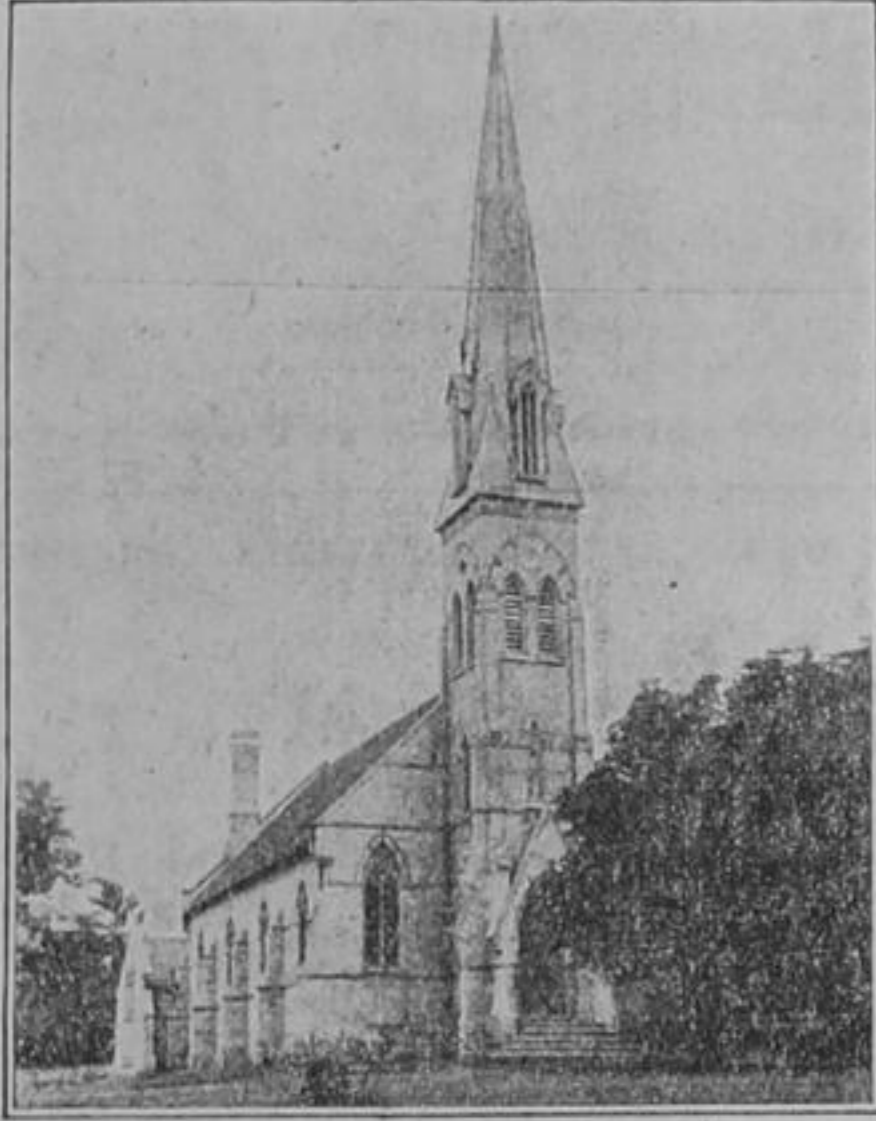

YORK BOYS' CLUBS

According to information just received from Agricultural Representative, W. M. Cockburn, of Newmarket, four Calf Clubs are being organized in York County this year sponsored by Sharon Junior Farmers, and the Agricultural Society at Schomberg, Markham and Woodbridge. In addition the Vellore Junior Farmers are sponsoring a new type of club which is indicative of the times. This is a Boys' Tractor Club and will be under the general supervision of the Agricultural Engineering Department of the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, in co-operation with the Agricultural Representative.

With a former York County Calf Club member winning a World's Championship on one of his cows, considerable added interest will no doubt be aroused in this line of work. Parents are urged to give their boys every encouragement to "Learn by Doing." This is the motto of club work.

The various Junior Farmer Clubs and Club Leaders are assuming the responsibility of securing membership in the clubs in their respective districts this year as Mr. Cockburn will be without an Assistant to supervise club work until June 1st, when the fourth year students graduate. There is a shortage of Assistant Representatives at the present time due to a number of Representatives being on sick leave or being superannuated.
