**SAFE DRIVING WILL HELP
ONTARIO'S TOURIST TRADE**

Reasonable assurance that visitors
will have an accident-free holiday
while in Canada is good tourist ad-
vertising. Ontario is taking the lead
in educating the public to drive and
walk carefully. A reputation for
safe highways and streets will be a
strong factor in attracting visitors
to this province and to this country.
The tourist business is Canada's sec-
ond largest source of needed Ameri-
can dollars, and we should let those
from other countries know that we
want them to have a safe visit and
that we are doing everything we can
to make this possible.

Traffic safety programs are well
known in the U.S.A. where they are
proving effective in reducing the ac-
cident toll. Knowledge that Canadi-
ans are just as concerned with pro-
tecting the travelling public would
favourably affect Americans paying
a visit here.

There is every indication that the
tourist traffic in Ontario would be
as great or even greater than last
year. This would mean that well
over a million visiting motorists en-
ter Ontario for lengthy stays and at
least another three million for short
periods. Add these figures to the
800,000 motor vehicles registered in
Ontario and the need is apparent for
the utmost use of care, courtesy and
common sense by all.

A good host is one who looks after
the comfort and wants of his guests.
If Canada is to play host to hundreds
of thousands of visitors, it is our
duty to see that their welfare, com-
fort and safety is our constant con-
cern. Such an attitude will pay di-
vidends in international goodwill and
national wealth.

NEW TYPE OF FARMERS

Recently, 36 young men were gradu-
ated from the two year course at the
Agricultural College at Guelph.
Practically all — 33 to be exact —
went back to the farm, in most cases
their own. In fact, according to re-
liable sources, more agricultural col-
lege graduates on a per capita basis
are going back to farms in Canada
than in any other country.

In the light of the worrisome prob-
lem of how to keep the boy on the
farm, these facts are most encourag-
ing indeed. They not only fore-
cast a brighter future for Canadian
agriculture, but can help make Can-
ada one of the world's most pro-
gressive food producing nations.

Some oldtimers may regard this
return of the college bred boy to the
farm with derision. Even some par-
ents who paid for their son's educa-
tion will rebel when the youngster
suggests a revision of time-tried
farming practices. "You can't plow
a field with a diploma" is an expres-
sion too often heard in several sec-
tions of the country.

Such an attitude is nonsensical.
There is much behind that diploma.
There are years of intense classroom
study; practical work on the best ex-
perimental farms on the continent;
scientific research in laboratories.
Yes, a diploma can plow, can sow
and, most important, can reap.
The public spirited, scientifically
trained farmer may well become the
leader in his community by helping
solve the problems of his less in-
formed neighbors. If he fails to
share his knowledge, he may as well
have not gone to school.
