Camp Ashunyoong To Commence June 29th

Camp Ashunyoong on Lake Simcoe will open this year on June 29th, reports Rev. Douglas Davis of Stouffville and, as usual, a number of boys and girls from Richmond Hill will attend. It will run for ten days.

The camp this year is being organized with the special needs of boys from eight to twelve years of age in mind. A special staff of eight counsellors has been chosen from senior students of Malvern Collegiate under Donald Moyer, science master. This group has been working in co-operation with the Ontario Camping Association in preparing the programme.

Revs. H. Howey, R. Chapin, D. Davis and Messrs. Douglas Hutchings and Cecil Davis are also members of the camp staff this year.

Each cabin will have a resident counsellor to ensure happy associations and proper rest periods. Adequate trained leadership will ensure individual instruction in swimming, camp crafts, athletics and related activities. The swimming instructor is certified by the Canadian Red Cross Society and holds the Bronze Medallion for life-saving. All counsellors are qualified to teach swimming and two are experienced life-guards.

The camp fee remains the same as last year. The record of the camp for seventeen years is one of a high standard of leadership, excellent meals and careful protection of those attending. Early registration is desirable. Further information may be had from Rev. D. Davis of Stouffville.

More Ancient Coins Owned By Maple Man

Mention in recent issues of The Liberal of old coins found in the district has brought to light other old money in the possession of local residents.

A collection of ancient tokens in the possession of Roy Baker, R. R. 2, Maple, has recently been shown to this paper. Among them is a British coin issued in 1776, during the reign of George III.

Mr. J. A. Bales of Richmond Hill has also shown The Liberal coins which he has found in his garden at various times. Among them is a Bank of Upper Canada halfpenny token dated 1857. Another dated 1844, is a halfpenny token issued by the Bank of Montreal, and still another is a Bank of Upper Canada penny dated 1857.

Oldest of the lot is a halfpenny token dated 1814 which has been so badly burned at some time or other that the issuer can not be determined.
