DONATES PRIZE FOR CROP COMPETITION

Mr. W. Seales, Manager of the Richmond Hill Pea Vinery has kindly donated the first prize for the winner of the Canning Pea Crop Competition, sponsored by the Richmond Hill Agricultural Society.

With election posters making their appearance locally interest in the forthcoming Federal election to be held on June 27th is beginning to heighten.

Returning Officer for the constituency of North York is Fred G. Hare of Temperanceville.

One advance poll only will be held in the riding. It will be in North York Township on June 23rd, 24th, 25th. Those entitled to vote at advance polls include only those who, by reason of their occupation, are forced to be absent from their usual place of residence on election day, such as railwaymen, seamen, commercial travellers, etc. Before being allowed to mark his ballot the would-be voter must be in possession of an advance poll certificate issued by the returning officer or his deputy.

Majority of Jack Smith, Liberal M.P. for the riding — who is also Liberal nominee in the present contest — in the 1945 election was 1355.

Between elections redistribution of the riding has brought back into the constituency the villages of Stouffville and Markham and the township of Markham.

Indicative of the tremendous growth of population in the riding are figures given by Returning Officer Fred Hare. There are 20,745 voters in North York Township alone for this election. In 1945 total number of voters for the whole constituency was 34,636.

Total numbers of voters recorded for the forthcoming election in North York constituency is 53,000 — nearly double the number in the 1945 election.

Urban polls in the constituency include the villages of Sutton, Stouffville and Markham; the township of Markham, the township of North York; sub-divisions 1 and 4 of the township of Whitchurch; sub-divisions 1 and 4 of the township of North Gwillimbury; sub-divisions 1 and 2 of the township of Georgina. In urban districts electors are entitled to vote only if their names have been added to the voters' list by June 11th.

In rural voting sub-divisions electors, in order to save themselves trouble, should make sure that their names are on the lists by 10 p.m. on June 9th. They can, however, by complying with certain formalities be sworn and vote on election day if their names have been omitted.

Standard time is used in all official election activities such as closing of lists and hours of voting.

A list of voters in his own sub-division is being mailed this week to every voter in a community designated as urban. In rural sub-divisions lists of voters are displayed at various points.

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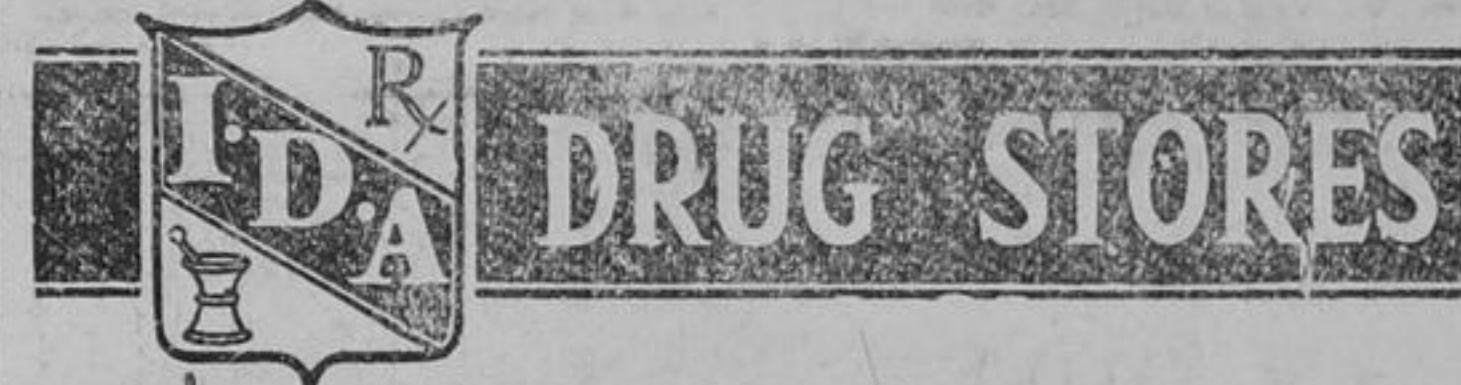
