OBSOLETE WORDS

Languages constantly change. Many words take on a new meaning while others pass out of use altogether. When we take up a book written, say, two centuries ago, we find it necessary to use a lexicon in order to understand these obsolete words. These words have been thrown out because there is no longer any need for them.

Archbishop Trench once wrote a book in which he listed hundreds of words which have been dropped and forgotten from our language.

Then new words are being introduced to our language. Every discovery brings a group of new nouns, adjectives, verbs, etc. Think of all the words brought by radio and airplanes, not to mention atomic power.

The Bible assures us that numerous words now in common use will some day become obsolete. They will become discarded because there will be nothing in human experience corresponding to them.

What are these words which are to become meaningless and unintelligible? Here are some of them: "Sorrow and sighing shall flee away" (Isaiah 35:10); "And there shall be no more death, neither sorrow, nor crying, neither shall there be any more pain; for the former things are passed away" (Revelation 21:4). Therefore the words which will have no meaning are sorrow, sighing, death, crying, pain. What a list! How large a place they have hitherto had in human experience! But it shall not always be so. As darkness flees before the coming dawn, these cruel and bitter experiences are to make way for joy and gladness; for peace, and rest, and satisfaction.

It seems strange that men have been prone to think of the Bible as a book with a deep prevailing undertone of sadness. They have even thought of religion as the foe of human happiness.

Some people have imagined that the cheerful man must necessarily be flippant. Rev. Hugh Black writes: "We are inclined to think that the bright and sunny nature must be shallow and that the melancholy temperament is more likely to be the deepest and the greatest . . . but it is to put the emphasis in the

wrong place when we disparage joy and exalt mere sorrow as a sign of either greatness or goodness. Sorrow is not an infallible of grace. It can come to a life and leave it poorer than before, whereas joy may be a source of insight, a secret of wisdom, and a fountain of strength.

There is a shallow cheerfulness, but there is also a shallow melancholy. Our common talk is even an injustice to God; a libel on His character. We should realize that joy is strength. Joy is the normal thing as health is normal. Wordsworth writes: "With the deep power of joy we see into the heart of things. Should this not be true, if there is at the heart of things, as we believe, perfect life, perfect joy, perfect love?"

The gladness of Jesus, his absolute certainty of victory, and his desire that his disciples should share his joy, are conspicuous in his teaching. "Rejoice," he says, "and be exceeding glad." This rendering hardly does justice to the original. A better translation would be: "Rejoice and leap for joy." When his disciples were timid, fearful and depressed, he said: "Be of good cheer, I have overcome the world." When his enemies wanted to attack him they called him a glutton and a winebibber. It was not true, but it does indicate that he was not sullen, morose and melancholy. He referred to himself as the "bridegroom." Note the significance of that word. It was a symbol of human joy. Jesus meant that he lived in the atmosphere of joy, and he wished his disciples to do the same.

Joy is a more divine thing than sorrow. Sorrow is a transient thing; it is abnormal, something destined to pass out of human experience. Joy shall last as long as God endures and that will be for all eternity.

Today's quotation is by Sir William Osler: "Hard work does not cause nervous breakdowns; it is the foul fiend of worry which is chiefly responsible."
