"Desire to make it known that whilst we do not object in principal to the creation of a town planning board, we are definitely opposed to the acquisition of our Church property. We submit, that our Church are, in themselves, a great asset to the community and an addition to amenities, and in view of the increasing exodus from city to country and country town and the necessity that will inexitably face us in the measurable future of extending our Church accommodation and buildings, we are convinced that it would be the greatest for us to support any such measure.

"We would call to your attention also that our Church is an old landmark in the district and revered by a very great number of people in all parts of the country, for whom it has most sacred associations.

"Consequently, we have thought it wise to draw up this petition, which we now present with our respectful and most urgent request that the measures referred to, in so far at least as it affects the property of All Saints Church, be withdrawn and abandoned."


