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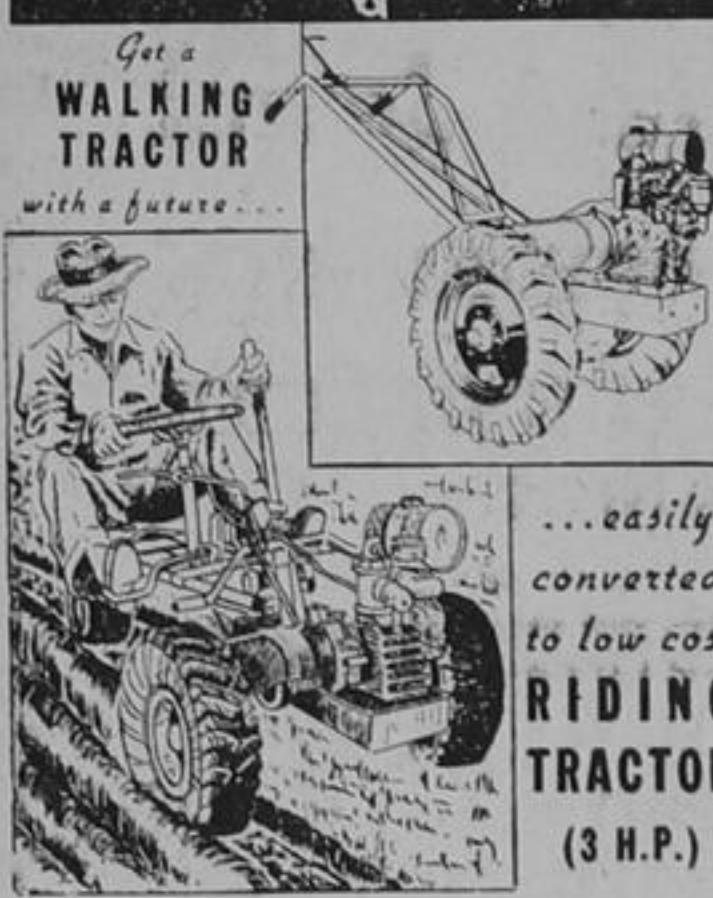

Wide Range Of Business Handled By Vaughan Township Councillors

Endeavouring to clean up a large accumulation of business held over from a previous meeting, Vaughan Township Council met at Maple on June 8th, with Reeve John Hostrowler in the chair and all members present.

A request by the Canadian Bank of Commerce for an extension of the present lease covering premises occupied in the Municipal Building, was read to council. The township clerk was instructed to advise the bank that the township proposed to occupy the whole of the building on the expiration of the present lease.

A letter from the Minister of Education disapproving a by-law dividing School Section No. 12 into two sections was read to council. In following discussion councillors considered the establishment of a township school area, especially in view of letters regarding Richvale and Langstaff schools.

Clerk McDonald was instructed to prepare a by-law creating two township school areas, one to include sections 1, 2 and 24, and the other to include remaining sections.

Purchase or expropriation of a parcel of land in the east part of lot 27, concession 1, as proposed by the trustees of school section No. 1, was considered by council. It was decided to await further direction from the Thornhill School Board.

Consider Woodbridge Annexation
Councillors considered settlement of assets and liabilities with regard

to the annexation of part of Vaughan Twp. to the village of Woodbridge. The reeve and deputy reeve were directed to consult with the township solicitor regarding this.

A letter from the Department of Lands and Forests detailed the regulations pertaining to hunting in the township as a regulated game preserve area and requested information as to whether the township wished to continue under present regulations.

Council approved of conditions as set out and the clerk was directed to advise the department to that effect.

The policy of partial payment of school money, as established in 1948, was discussed and the treasurer was instructed to arrange for partial payment on the same basis as last year, and to include the Richmond Hill High School Board and the Woodbridge and Richmond Hill Public School Boards.

The clerk was directed to request the Toronto and York County Roads Commission to grant permission to the Maple Recreation Association for the holding of a street dance on the county road on Wednesday, July 13.

A discussion regarding the suggested County Health Unit resulted in the reeve and deputy reeve being instructed to consider the same and discuss the matter further with officers of other municipalities in the proposed area and, upon receipt of information, to consult with the council further.

Banking Head



J. U. Boyer, newly elected president of The Canadian Bankers' Association was born on a farm at St. Andre Avellan, Quebec, July 30, 1899.

He started his banking career in 1918, entering the services of the Provincial Bank of Canada direct from school. Today he is general manager of the Bank and in addition a director.

It is almost a tradition in Canadian banking for the top of the chartered banks to come up the ladder from junior ranks. Mr. Boyer was no exception. He held various positions in Montreal, Ottawa and Windsor, Ontario, before his appointment in 1930 as manager of the Bank's main office in Montreal. Six years later, in January 1936, he was made general manager of his Bank, and, as such, a member of The Canadian Bankers' Association. He became a vice-president of the Association in November 1945.

Mr. Boyer always has shown a keen interest in social welfare. He is honorary-treasurer of L'Institut Bruchesi de Montreal, Inc. and of Les Champs de Sante Bruchesi. He is also a director of The Family Welfare Bureau of which he is a charter member. In 1946 he became a director of the Public Health Nursing School of the University of Montreal. He takes an active part in the annual campaigns of La Federation des Oeuvres de charite canadiennes-francaises.

In recognition of his devotion to the welfare of his fellow-men Pope Pius XII saw fit to decorate him with the medal "Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice" in April 1949.

He is a member of the Chamber of Commerce and Board of Trade and his favourite sports are hunting and golf.
