Motor-Cycle Police To Patrol Yonge St.
 Giving special mention to Yonge Street as a heavily congested road, Hon. Dana Porter, Provincial Attorney-General, has announced that motor cycle details of the Provincial Police will be assigned to curb speeding and reckless driving and cut down the accident toll.
 Mr. Porter said the Provincial Police were reintroducing motor cycle details on many of the more congested highways. "Several years ago," he said, "the department abandoned the motor-cycle for the now familiar white and black radio-equipped squad car, but a recent survey revealed the necessity of some motor-cycles on traffic-congested roads such as the Queen Elizabeth Way and Yonge Street. We have approximately twelve new machines on order and they should be in service by July 1st."
 "We found that in heavy traffic the regular patrol car is at a disadvantage," said Commissioner Stringer of the Provincial Police. "It becomes bogged down just as other cars do. The motor-cycle, on the other hand, will be used only in the summer months but will be held in readiness for any emergency throughout the year."

North York Liberal Ladies' Assn. Picnic Attracts Three Thousand
 Seldom in its long history has the fine old Mulock homestead at Armitage seen such a big and happy gathering as the one which took place there on the afternoon of Saturday, June 18th, when North York voters and their families turned out in their thousands to say "how do" and "good luck" to Jack Smith, M.P., as for a second time he carries the York North Liberal banner in the Federal election campaign.
 Preparations had been made for a big crowd but the attendance exceeded the expectations of even the most optimistic Liberal campaigner. It was conservatively estimated that around three thousand people attended.
 Sponsored by the York North Women's Liberal Association, the picnic was staged by the ladies to give as many voters as possible the opportunity of meeting the man who had represented them at Ottawa for the last four years. By the end of the event Jack Smith knew how the Prince of Wales used to feel at the end of a strenuous day of receiving Canadian citizens while on a tour of the country for his hand, too, was feeling the effects of the grips given to it by thousands of well-wishers.
 Historic Spot
 Speeches, in keeping with the character of the event and the weather, were brief. They included a short address by Mrs. N. L. Matthews, president of the North York Women's Liberal Association, and a welcome by Col. the Hon. W. P. Mulock, former representative of the riding and Postmaster-General in the Mackenzie King cabinet until his enforced retirement through illness prior to the last election.
 Jack Smith, M.P., in his address stressed the fact that the picnic was being held at a place where Canada's great Prime Minister, Sir Wilfrid Laurier had often come for rest, relaxation and discussion with his old friend, Sir William Mulock. There too another Premier, Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, had often relaxed on the verandah while he discussed affairs of state with his compatriot, the younger William Mulock.
 Representatives of all parts of the riding were present at the event and were entertained by music from the Newmarket Citizens' Band and singing by strolling troubadours. Tea cup readers found many patrons among the ladies and other forms of entertainment added to the enjoyment of the big crowd.

Harry Stanford Honored By Church Prior To Departure To Native Land
 On Sunday, June 19th, immediately following morning service, the congregation of St. Mary's Anglican Church, Richmond Hill, gathered in the Parish Hall for a brief meeting. The Rector called the meeting to order and stated the object, which was to convey to Harry Stanford the good wishes of "his many friends for a pleasant trip to the land of his birth. Mr. Wrixon reminded those present that Mr. Stanford had held every office it was possible for a layman of the church to hold, and that when the history of the church is written, no name will be more outstanding than that of Harry Stanford. "He has not only given liberally of time, and talent to the Church," said Mr. Wrixon, "but has been sincere in the practice of his churchmanship." "No man is more highly respected in the Church and out of the Church," The Rector then called upon one of the senior members of the congregation, Reeve P. C. Hill, to express the good wishes of the congregation. Mr. Hill said that he had known Harry Stanford longer than any one present, and spoke of his high qualities as a citizen of Richmond Hill. The Reeve then read an address of presentation as follows —
 "Dear Harry:
 The members of the congregation of St. Mary's Church feel that we cannot let this opportunity pass without expressing our thanks and appreciation of your valued service to the Church in some material way.
 No one can tell the extent of your loyalty and service during the past years, and the esteem and affection in which you are held not only by the members of this congregation, but by our citizens generally.
 I know that I speak for all present here this morning, as well as for many who are absent, when I say, that we wish you a very pleasant trip to the land of your birth, and may you return to us refreshed in body and spirit.
 This Church and Village are, we believe fortunate in having you in our midst, and we hope you may be spared to us, for many years to come.
 We ask you to accept this twin set of pigskin suit cases as a small token of our great affection for you."
 Mr. R. D. Little and Mr. C. Bancroft handed the cases to Mr. Stanford and Mr. Ted Mansbridge gave him an envelope containing "a few shillings with which to buy some Woodbines."
 Mr. Stanford, who was the most surprised man in the gathering, replied d with a few fitting remarks, thanking the congregation for its kindness and remarking that he had never looked for material gain for the service he had rendered to the Church.
