E. W. & Mrs. Brown Woodbridge, Mark 50th Anniversary

Newspapers of fifty years ago carried an announcement which said: — "MARRIED: On Wednesday, June 21st, 1899, at Thistleton, by Rev. T. A. Watson, Amy Emily, only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Rowntree, to Edwin Webster Brown, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Brown of Brampton, Ontario."

And on June 21st, 1949, many residents of the district gathered at the home of the Browns on Wallace St., Woodbridge, to wish them continued happiness as they celebrated their fiftieth wedding anniversary. Gifts and floral tributes indicated the esteem in which they were held and provided an outstanding recognition of the part which they had played in the life of their community for many years.

Notable among the tributes was a bank of fifty red roses, gift of the Woodbridge Council, which Mr. Brown has served as village clerk for the past forty-five years and as treasurer for the past thirty.

In former years Mr. and Mrs. Brown were active in all the social events of the district. In addition to carrying on his printing business which has been in the same location since 1904, Mr. Brown has been W. M. of Blackwood Lodge, A.F. and A.M.; W.M. of N. Clarke Wallace L. O. Lodge; W.M. Grouse Hill L. O. Lodge, Weston; W.M. Vaughan District L. O. Lodge, and in addition has been president of the Woodbridge Agricultural Society.

Their bridesmaid, Mrs. Joe Hillier (nee Ida Brown) of Frankfort, Mich., and groomsmen, Wm. Maynard of Toronto, are both living but on account of illness were unable to be present.

One daughter, Amy Evelyn, now Mrs. W. M. Myers of Woodbridge, blessed the Brown union, arriving on their seventh wedding anniversary. Their one granddaughter, Suzanne Eileen Myers, was present at the golden wedding celebrations.

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Big Crowd Shows Appreciation Of Paper's Election Service

From the moment the first election bulletin was posted in the window of The Liberal office at 7.10 p.m. on election day until the "wee sma' hours" Richmond Hill citizens showed by their attendance that they appreciated the service which the paper provided for the village in bringing in speedy election results.

The space in front of the office window was never vacant from the time the first election result was flashed and at times a crowd of several hundred citizens overflowed the sidewalk and covered Yonge Street to the opposite side.

Excitement reached its peak when the victor, Jack Smith, publisher of The Liberal, arrived at his office accompanied by bands and cheering supporters. In a very brief and happy speech he thanked those who had worked for him, and went on to thank his supporters in other parts of the big constituency.

From the moment the first district return was received the issue of the

local campaign was never in doubt. As one sub-division after another sent in its figures it soon became evident that the only question was "How big is the majority?" As the figures of each polling division were posted in the Liberal's window, they were greeted with cheers, and when finally a big streamer announced "SMITH WINS" a great burst of applause went up from the crowded street.

By radio and telephone results were collected speedily from all parts of the constituency and, with nationwide reports, were posted by members of the paper's staff, giving Richmond Hill a service as speedy and inclusive as that in any of the big cities.

Particularly noticeable was the good temper and orderly conduct of the crowd which filled Yonge Street. No untoward incidents marked the evening and victors and vanquished alike seemed to take everything in good spirits.

Figures showing the results by polling sub-divisions in North York appear elsewhere in this issue.

Town Planning Report Nearly Ready Has Unique Features, Says Tomlin

"It won't be long now." That is the latest statement given by Councillor Ken Tomlin in connection with the presentation of the town planning report for Richmond Hill.

The planning board has held nine meetings and, as a result, the outline of the plan is complete, says Councillor Tomlin. All that remains now is for it to be whipped into shape for presentation to the village council.

A "somewhat different approach," to employ Councillor Tomlin's words, is being utilized by his board in dealing with the question of town planning. An effort has been made to consider both sides of the question — that of the citizen interested in building a home and that of the municipality whose future depends upon what is planned now.

A unique feature, it is forecast, will be in connection with the occupation of temporary quarters during the home building period. In some municipalities a cash deposit to ensure that temporary quarters will not become permanent eyesores is required. It is understood that this will not apply in Richmond Hill

— or at least will not be recommended by the town planning board — but that a broader system, designed to assist rather than to discourage home builders will be suggested.

There is a possibility that certain aspects of town planning may be presented to the village council at its meeting on Tuesday, July 5th.

School Area For Richvale, Thornhill Langstaff Approved

In one of the keenest debates in many months Vaughan Township councillors, holding a special meeting at Maple on June 29th, gave consideration to two by-laws dealing with the division of the township into two school areas, replacing the present school sections.

The first by-law was adopted with little discussion as letters from trustees of school sections at Thornhill, Richvale and Langstaff indicated complete approval of the plan. Consequently the by-law, which will embody schools in the three communities as Area No. 1, was passed rapidly, subject to the endorsement of Markham Township Council. Present school sections will be dissolved as at December 25th this year and an area board elected. Some financial benefits will accrue to the present school sections as increased grants are payable to them for the present year.

Strong Opposition

Letters received from school sections in the northern part of the township indicated a strong division of opinion, running fifty-fifty for and against, with determined opposition being revealed by those opposed to the school area plan. The long debate which followed the reading of the letters indicated councillors, on the whole, to be in favour of the advantages of the school area plan but unwilling to force it through against the wishes of the school sections. It was pointed out by some councillors that some school sections would find themselves in a precarious position before long due to increased population and through having reached the limit of their spending powers. Without greatly increased taxation, it was pointed out, it would be difficult for them to take care of school demands.

A long distance view of the situation was urged by those councillors who favoured the immediate establishment of a second school area.

When the vote was taken councillors were equally divided, two being for the establishment of the area and two against. The deciding vote against the area was cast by Reeve John Hostrawser.

Richmond Hill Voters Stage Record Turnout

Richmond Hill voters took their obligations seriously on June 27th. 1,051 voters — approximately 85% of those entitled to vote — went to the polls, which possibly constitutes a record for the Dominion. 632 of them marked their ballots in favour of Smith — 337 of them voted for Woods, giving Smith 213 votes more than his two opponents combined.

Real Estate Active Ridout Co. Reports

Considerable activity has occurred in the real estate business during the past week, Ernest Ridout Real Estate Ltd. reports. That firm has sold six houses since last Saturday, four in Richmond Hill and the other two outside the village.
