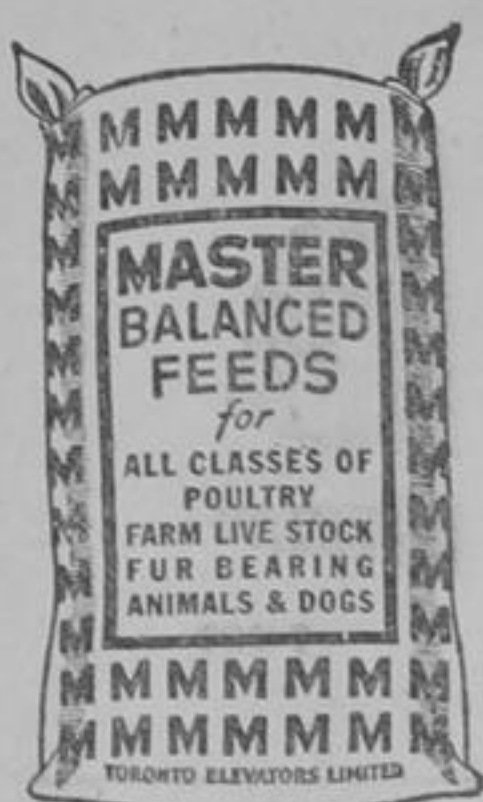

FEEDERS WHO KEEP RECORDS EVENTUALLY BUY MASTER

'WAY BACK WHEN

(Excerpts from the LIBERAL Files of October 17, 1889)

"Subscribe for the Weekly Empire, now the great weekly paper of the Dominion," said an advertisement.

An advertisement by William French said "In returning thanks to my numerous friends for their liberal patronage during the last thirty years I beg to remind them and the general public that having erected new and commodious premises I am enabled to supply phaetons, buggies, carriages, cutters, sleighs and platform spring waggons."

"The Mongolian friends of Ah Sing tried to give him a good send off when they buried him on Sunday at the cemetery at Evergreens, New York. A quantity of food was placed beside the casket. It included two packages of rice, two chickens, several kinds of nuts, whisky, grapes, oranges and other kinds of fruit as well as two packages of cigarettes. One of the grave diggers, an Irishman, gazed longingly at the roasted chickens. The temptation was too great for him and he picked them up, while the Chinamen present looked on with horror, but they fought fiercely when the other grave diggers wanted to sample the whisky. By this time a large crowd had gathered to watch the ceremonies. The crowd remained passive until the friends of Ah Sing began pouring the fruit into the grave, then another and another, until the whole crowd were scrambling for the eatables. The Chinamen then set up an outcry and it looked for a few minutes as if a riot would ensue. Several officers attached to the cemetery rushed to the scene and begged the crowd to desist and tried to calm the celestials."

"There appears to be a good prospect for the erection of a large building on the Park before winter sets in, which will answer for an Agricultural Hall, skating rink, curling rink and other purposes. That such a building is required, not only by the Agricultural Society but by the citizens of the village, all will admit. . . . There are funds in the hands of the treasurer of the society to the amount of about \$300.00 and if the village will grant an equal sum we think that a joint committee would be justified in starting the work at once."

Vaughan Township Council authorized payment, among others, of the following accounts:

To Wm. Mellish for building bridge and drawing material on Elgin Mills side road and filling in washout on 2nd concession, \$30.00.

To Richard Haslem for drawing gravel on Woodbridge side road, 124 1/2 yards, \$56.40.

To W. J. Thornback for nineteen five inch tile and twenty-two five inch tile, \$1.59.

From Maple news: — "Our brand new brass band serenaded the village on Tuesday evening, rendering "British Grenadiers" and "Marching Through Georgia."

"The Reeve, Assessors and Clerk of Vaughan Township met at the Town Hall, Vellore, on Thursday of last week for the purpose of selecting jurors. They selected fifteen first class and sixteen second class for the Grand Jury and seventy-five first class and forty-eight second class for the Petit Jury."

"The directors of the Mechanics Institute met on Tuesday evening. Eleven members were present. The Library Committee recommended some important changes. Ticket-sellers were instructed to give catalogues to those purchasing tickets of membership. The Re-union committee was instructed to get up an opening entertainment."

"A by-law was passed by the village council to authorize the levying and collecting of taxes for the year 1889. The rates struck are as follows: For County tax \$193.60; Public School tax, \$824.60; High School tax, \$262.50; Village taxes, \$787.50."

"Mr. James Eckardt, License Inspector for East York, paid an official visit to the village on Friday and inspected the three hotels."

Winter Employment At Record Level, Says Bank Report

The total number of persons employed in Canada during the past winter was the highest on record for the first quarter of the year, says the monthly "Commercial Letter" published by the Canadian Bank of Commerce, but weather conditions were responsible for a greater than seasonal decline between 1st December and 1st March. Preliminary figures for 1st April showed a further decline, though the official index of employment remained at a slightly higher level than on 1st April 1948. A seasonal curtailment in logging operations was in evidence in New Brunswick, Quebec and Ontario, but more favourable weather conditions helped the employment situation elsewhere, especially in British Columbia which had suffered previously from a shortage of power and an unusually severe winter. By the first week in May total employment in Ontario, where over half the hourly-rated workers are employed, had shown some improvement, largely because of the opening up of out-door activity in farming, construction and transportation. Some recession was apparent, however, in several branches of manufacturing, notably the rubber, textile and certain departments of the steel industry, which were then operating on a four-day week. Demand for farm hands exceeded the supply but in the lumber industry crews were being rounded up with little difficulty for the river drives in May. Construction work, new contracts for which have so far been above the level of the past year, was slow in getting started, and was held up by a quite prolonged and widespread strike in the City of Toronto. The same tardiness in starting spring construction operations was in evidence in the Prairie division, including the lakehead area of Ontario. Total placements in the Prairie Provinces were, however, increasing rapidly and, while the demand for farm workers was limited largely to those experienced in handling power machinery, and the coal mines were seasonally quiet, activity in other directions, largely oil developments in Alberta and Saskatchewan, iron mining operations at Atikokan, Ont., and widespread construction projects, were expected to take up most of the slack.

This spring sees the graduation from University of several thousand young men and women, mostly war veterans, professionally trained to take their place in business and industry. Last fall it was anticipated that owing to the unusually large number likely to be seeking employment this spring some difficulty might be experienced in placing them. This is, however, proving to be less a problem than was expected, owing to the fine co-operation of employers generally.

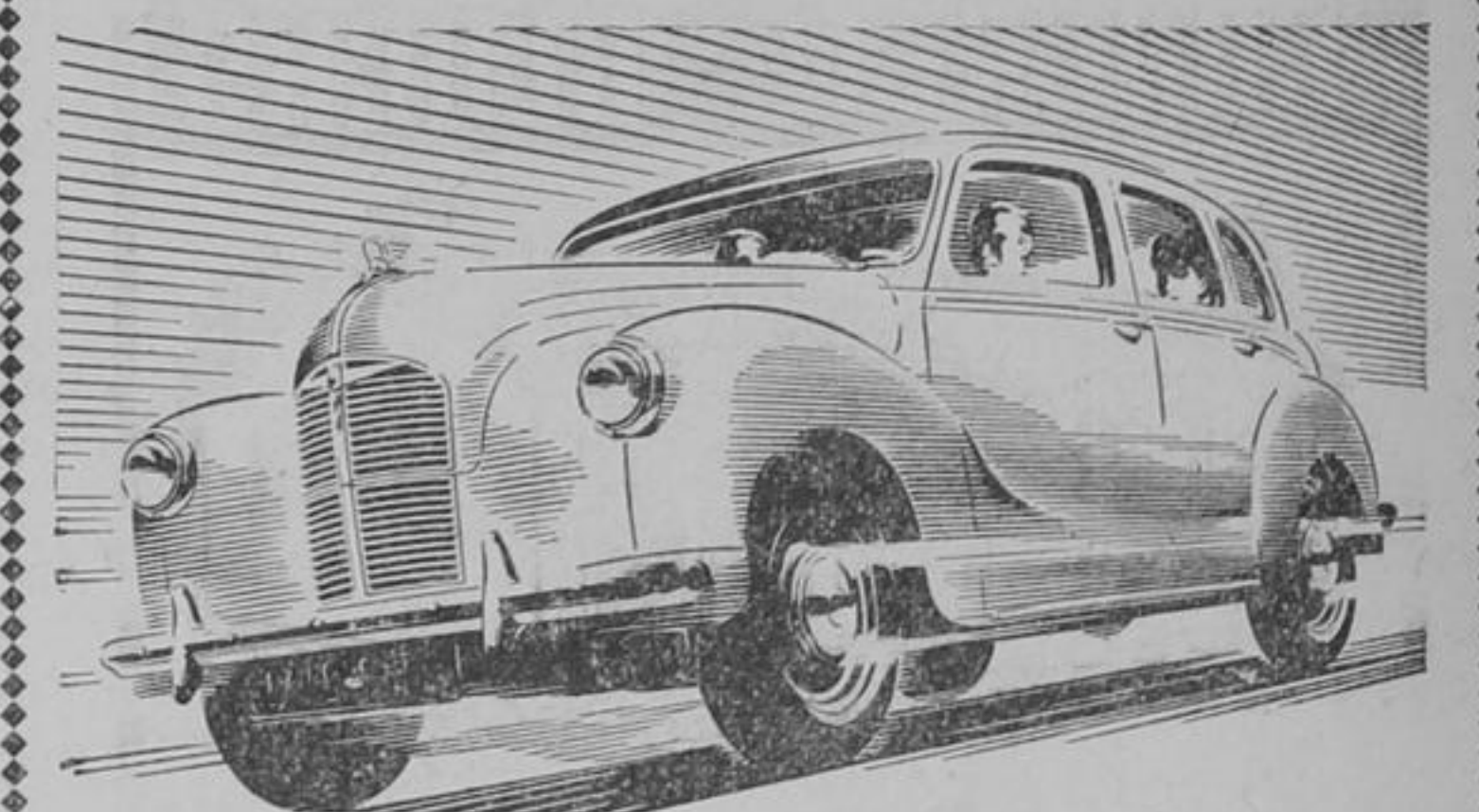
