

Test Blasts Show Danger Of Coal Dust

No one has been killed or injured by the blasting he started 39 years ago. In fact he can be credited with helping to save the lives of thousands of miners.

Howarth, 58, is superintendent of the experimental coal mine operated by the United States Bureau of Mines in the coal-rich area about 13 miles from Pittsburgh. The explosion demolishes everything in its path. How can coal-dust explosions be

Again Howarth comes up with a concrete example. He drops a cloud of coal dust onto an open flame by means of a blast of compressed air.
The ensuing explosion can be felt 100 yards away.

Then coal dust and rock dust are mixed in a 65-36 ratio and the cloud formed from the mixture fails to explode under the same conditions. Howarth said the precaution of spreading rock dust in passageways of United States coal mines now is in wide use.
