High School Trustees Visit Other Centres In Extension Planning

Purely routine matters were dealt with at the regular monthly meeting of the Richmond Hill High School Board held on October 6. The one exception was a showing of films by a firm of architects, demonstrating various types of buildings which they have supervised.

All four municipalities having given their approval to the extension of the High School building, the matter now rests in the hands of village authorities and the Ontario Municipal Board. No further action can be taken by the High School Board until the legal preliminaries are completed.

In the meantime, however, trustees have visited schools at Listowel and Leaside in order to be fully posted on modern school building developments, and expect to visit other centres in the near future.

Vitamin C

Which form of canned fruit juices contains the largest amount of Vitamin C?

According to the Council on Foods and Nutrition of the American Medical Association, canned lemon juice contains the largest amount of vitamin C per unit. Orange juice is next, grapefruit juice next, then tomato juice and pineapple juice. The commercial fruit beverages have no fixed standard of vitamin C content, and are an unsatisfactory source.
