"New Canadian's" Letter Gives Practical Example Of High School Training

The class for New Canadians in English and Citizenship at the Richmond Hill High School has increased to some forty members. It has been found necessary to divide it into two units, one for beginners and one for those with some background in English. Mrs. J. R. Cross, a teacher with experience in this work, has taken over the second division.

The type of immigrant, and his sincere desire to become completely Canadian, is well illustrated by the following letter, written as an exercise in the advanced class and is printed without corrections. The writer, Mr. Willems, has been in Canada one year and a half; he had some High School English in Holland and joined the class to improve his knowledge of the written language.

Here is his letter:
Elgin Mills, November 18, 1949
Dear Madam:

Referring to what you told us about writing each other a letter and using all four different kinds of sentences, I will do so and tell you something about the Dutch immigrants.

Most of the immigrants you'll meet here in Canada are farmers, although you'll find several others who were not farming in the old country but were connected with farming and can see the possibility of farming in this great country.

Naturally you'll say: "Why do the Dutch farmers come to Canada?" The answer will be The Netherlands are overpopulated. A great deal of very good farmland has been ruined by the war. There is no possibility for acquiring land for their own and their big families. Therefore these farmers are looking for a place where they can live with their family and use their talents and skill for which they are well-known all over the world.

They have several good qualifications and have a thorough experience in mixed farming; dairy-farming; market-gardening; fruit-growing and very well known for growing bulbs and flowers.

Many people have a hard time when they come out. There are two reasons for that. The first and main one is the fact that most of them cannot or not sufficiently speak and write the English language and it's therefore that we all are very thankful to the Ontario Department of Education and especially to the teachers who learn us their language and in many cases more than that.

The second reason is the fact that almost all of the elderly immigrants employed one or more men in the old country and have now to be an employee themselves. I know by experience that it's hard obeying when the employer says: "Go and clean out the pig-pens and horse-stables and as soon as you're ready do this and do that."

We knew all this when we were still in the old country and yet we came because we knew that we could do everything that anybody would ask us to do. We have the will to succeed and we will succeed, just as well as our ancestors who came here years ago and are nowadays well-known farmers or businessmen.

And so will once our children, with the help we get now from people like you, sing side by side with your children: "O Canada! Our home and native land. True patriot love in all thy sons command."

Nearly Six Thousand Voters in Vaughan

There are 4,785 persons entitled to vote as resident voters in the forthcoming municipal elections in Vaughan Township and 849 non-resident voters, reports Township Clerk James M. McDonald.

Cost of the new unit, which has been under discussion for many months, will be borne by the municipalities on a proportionate basis established on the equalized assessment. It is anticipated that this will cost the village of Richmond Hill about \$200,000 more per year than the present arrangement but, as almost every councillor stated, a superior and more comprehensive type of service would be given. It will include a full-time Medical Officer of Health, sanitary inspection, milk inspection, provision of trained school nurses, etc., 50% of the cost of the service is born by the province.

Governing body of the new unit, which is expected to come into operation in the middle of 1950, will be a ten-man board. One member is appointed by the provincial government and one by each of the participating municipalities.

Jefferson Trustees Make Announcement About New Building

The school board of S. S. No. 4 Markham and No. 21 Vaughan would like to make the following statement on the new school situation.

The long delay in calling a rate-payers' meeting is very much regretted. Immediately after the board was authorized to purchase a new site the following action was taken:

A recommendation to proceed with a new building programme was submitted to the Department of Education by our School Inspector. As soon as the Department's approval was obtained, the Board visited a considerable number of schools and prepared a tentative plan.

After consulting with our Building Plan Committee and several contractors, a revised plan was prepared. The preparation of a detailed plan and specifications was undertaken early in September by a construction company. In spite of constant urging the information is not yet available.

Final plans will be submitted to a ratepayers meeting for approval as soon as they are completed. In the meantime, a complete report is being prepared which will be presented at the annual meeting in December.
