Plans and specification can be seen and forms of tender obtained at the offices of the Chief Architect, Department of Public Works, Ottawa, Ontario, and the District Architect, 36 Adelaide Street East, Toronto, Ontario.

Tenders will not be considered unless made on the forms supplied by the Department and in accordance with the conditions set forth therein.

Each tender must be accompanied by a certified cheque on a chartered bank in Canada payable to the Order of the Honourable the Minister of Public Works, equal to 10 per cent of the amount of the tender, or Bearer Bonds of the Dominion of Canada or of the Canadian National Railway Company and its constituent companies, unconditionally guaranteed as to principal and interest by the Dominion of Canada, or the aforementioned bonds and a certified cheque if required to make up the odd amount.

NOTE — The Department, through the Chief Architect's Office and the office of the District Architect, 36 Adelaide Street East, Toronto, Ontario, will supply blueprints and specification of the work on deposit of a sum of \$15.00 in the form of a certified bank cheque payable to the order of the Minister of Public Works. The deposit will be released on return of the blueprints and specification within a month from the date of reception of tenders. If not returned within that period the deposit will be forfeited.

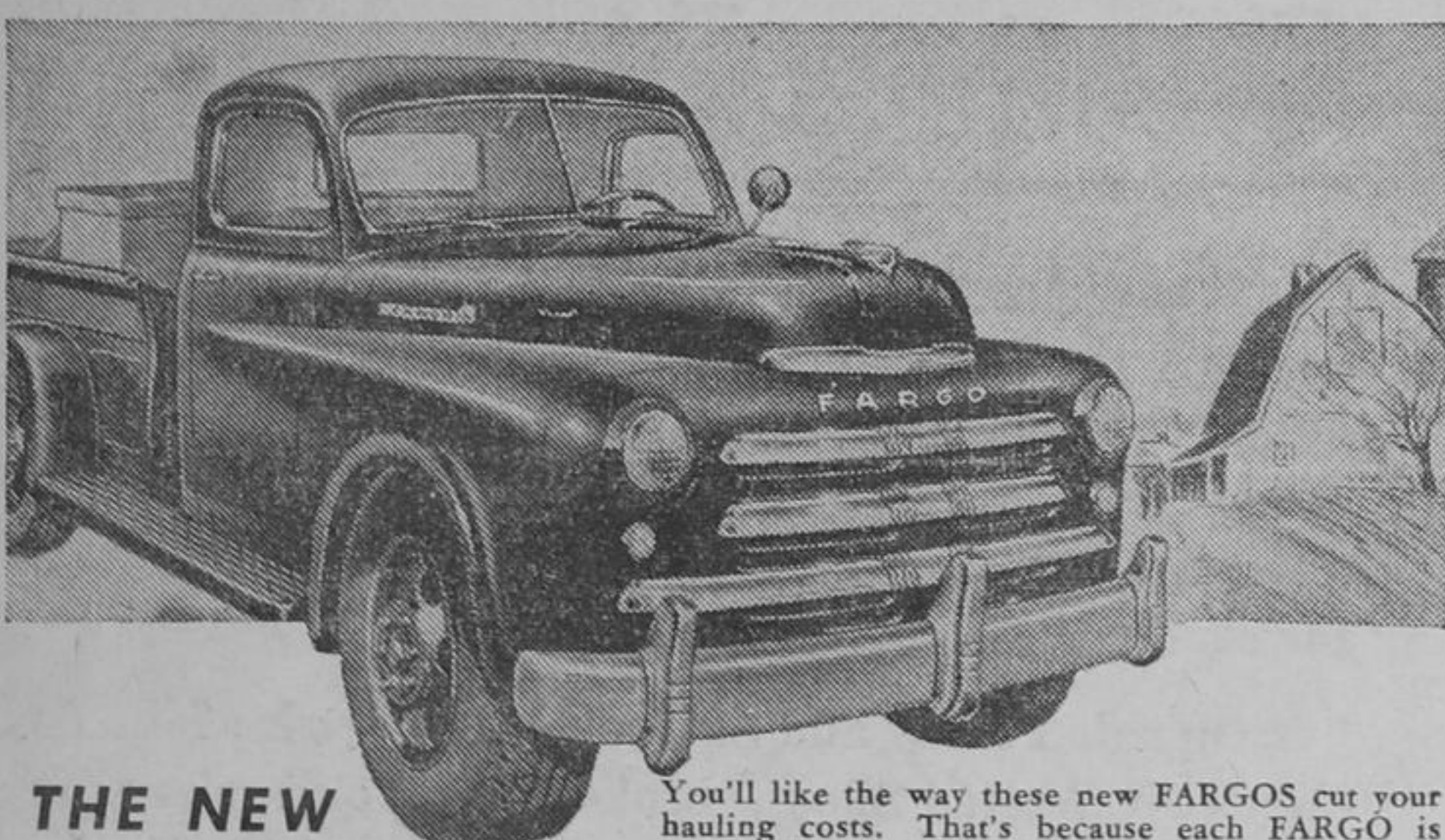
