Sir Ian Fraser, in his 34th annual report, entitled "Lighten Our Darkness" shows how training at St. Dunstan's in Sussex, England, lasts from one to four years with much individual attention and teaching. Each man begins by learning to read Braille and to use a typewriter; to dress, shave and find his way; and then studies for his life work. He may take up manual work in factories, operate telephone switch boards, practice physiotherapy, manage and later own a shop bought by St. Dunstan's, or he may live by handicraft. The number of men training at St. Dunstan's had been expected to drop more quickly after the war, but there were many who went blind later.
