Annual Vestry Meeting
The Annual Vestry Meeting of
Trinity Church was held in the
Parish Hall on Monday, January
29, when a large number of mem-
bers were present to hear reports
for 1950 and to make plans and to
elect officers for 1951.

Financial
The Wardens in presenting their
financial report showed a comfort-
able balance in each of their ac-
counts, total receipts in the Gen-
eral Account being nearly five
thousand dollars. Of this amount
six hundred dollars went for mis-
sions.

Reporting on the Building fund
it was shown that sufficient funds
are on hand to complete the re-
building of the church.

Election of Officers
People's Warden for 1951 is Mr.
George Bellerman, with Mr. Reg.
Byford elected as Junior People's
Warden. Mr. Wm. Lennox was
appointed by the Rector as his
warden.

Mr. Bruce Ross and Mr. Reg.
Byford were elected Lay Delegates
to Synod, with Mr. Martin Powell
as alternate. Mr. Powell was also
elected auditor for 1951.

General Business
The budget for 1951 was accept-
ed, being set at six thousand dol-
ars including seven hundred dol-
ars for missions.

It was decided to enlarge the
Parish Council to meet the needs
of a growing parish, so that the
council will now have six elected
representatives from the Vestry in
addition to all Church officers and
two representatives from each or-
ganization.

The women of the Vestry re-
quested that the right be granted
to women to sit as members of the
Diocesan Synod, and a motion to
that effect was carried unanime-
ly, requesting the Parish's Lay
Delegates to Synod do all in their
power to bring about the necessary
changes in the Canons and the
Constitution of the Diocese.

An outstanding feature of this
meeting was the large number of
enthusiastic men present, auguring
well for the future activities of the
Parish. A very happy evening
was brought to an end by refresh-
ments served by the members of
the W. A.
