Manslaughter Case To Follow Fatality

A three car crash on No. 11 highway just south of Langstaff last Friday morning killed one girl and put a man and woman in Toronto General Hospital. The dead girl was Helen Ruby Hellier, 23, of St. John's Newfoundland, who was enroute to take a new job in Toronto when the crash occurred. She was in a machine driven by Mrs. Earl Griffin of Newmarket which figured in a collision with a car driven by Floyd Roberts of Richmond Hill. Both Roberts and Mrs. Griffin were hospitalized. According to Provincial Police investigating the accident, the Roberts car, northbound, swerved across the road, sideswiped one driven by James Y. Murdoch, Jr. or Newmarket and then crashed head-on into the Griffin machine.

Roberts still in the hospital with a broken leg is being charged with drunken driving and manslaughter and was placed under special guard in the hospital over the week-end when he reported to police that he had received an unsigned letter in which threats were made he "would be shot dead."
