## Debt Rises From \$18,000 To \$500,000 In 3 Years

Alarmed by a consistently spiralling debenture debt and determined to keep residential areas within reasonable bounds Vaughan Township council Tuesday on the recommendation of Its planning Board voted to ban entirely for the year 1951 approval of new subdivisions in the township save where residential areas have now been set up and to restrict it sharply even in these areas.

The area in which sharply restricted subdividing may be approved is from Steele's Avenue to Elgin Mills and from Bathurst to Yonge Streets. In all other sections of the municipality, subdividing is out entirely.
