Markham Farm To Raise Prize Jerseys By Island Standards

The world famous sire, Design's Royal Jester, a 6 year old, twice Champion on Jersey Island, highlighted a shipment of 41 Jersey cattle which arrived last Thursday at Valleyanna Farms (R. R. No. 1 Markham, Ontario).

This importation will form the nucleus of a breeding herd to be raised according to Island standards. It will be the only herd in Canada, operating 100% on this basis.

Selection of the cattle from hundreds of Island Jerseys was made in October, 1950 by the well known manager of Valleyanna Farms, Mr. Bert McGrath.

Progeny of Design's Royal Jester brought this bull the Highest Honour in October 1949 and May 1950. His dam, Design's November Nance besides having 3 records of over 700 lbs. of fat on Jersey Island, has three times been Grand Champion; including the October 1948 and August 1949 and May 1950.

Design's Royal Jester's sire, La Sente's Royal Jester 2nd, has been near the top with his progeny at several all island shows. His dam is a paternal half sister to the imported cow, Jester's Royal Maid, rated in 1950 as the greatest Jersey brood cow of all time.

Jester's Royal Maid is particularly well known in Canada as the dam of the famous show and producing bull, Brampton Jester Standard 2nd.

Included in this shipment are daughters of such well known sires as, La Sente's Designer's Standard, Belmont Gilpin, Winsome Beau — several times an island winner — and Royal Ceres Designer, winner of a Second with his Junior progeny in 1948.

There is a 2 year old daughter of Jester's Dreaming Lad — many times a winner on the Island —

Years ago the Keffer family settled near Maple. One day a little son was born, and new father bought a clock to celebrate the birthday.
