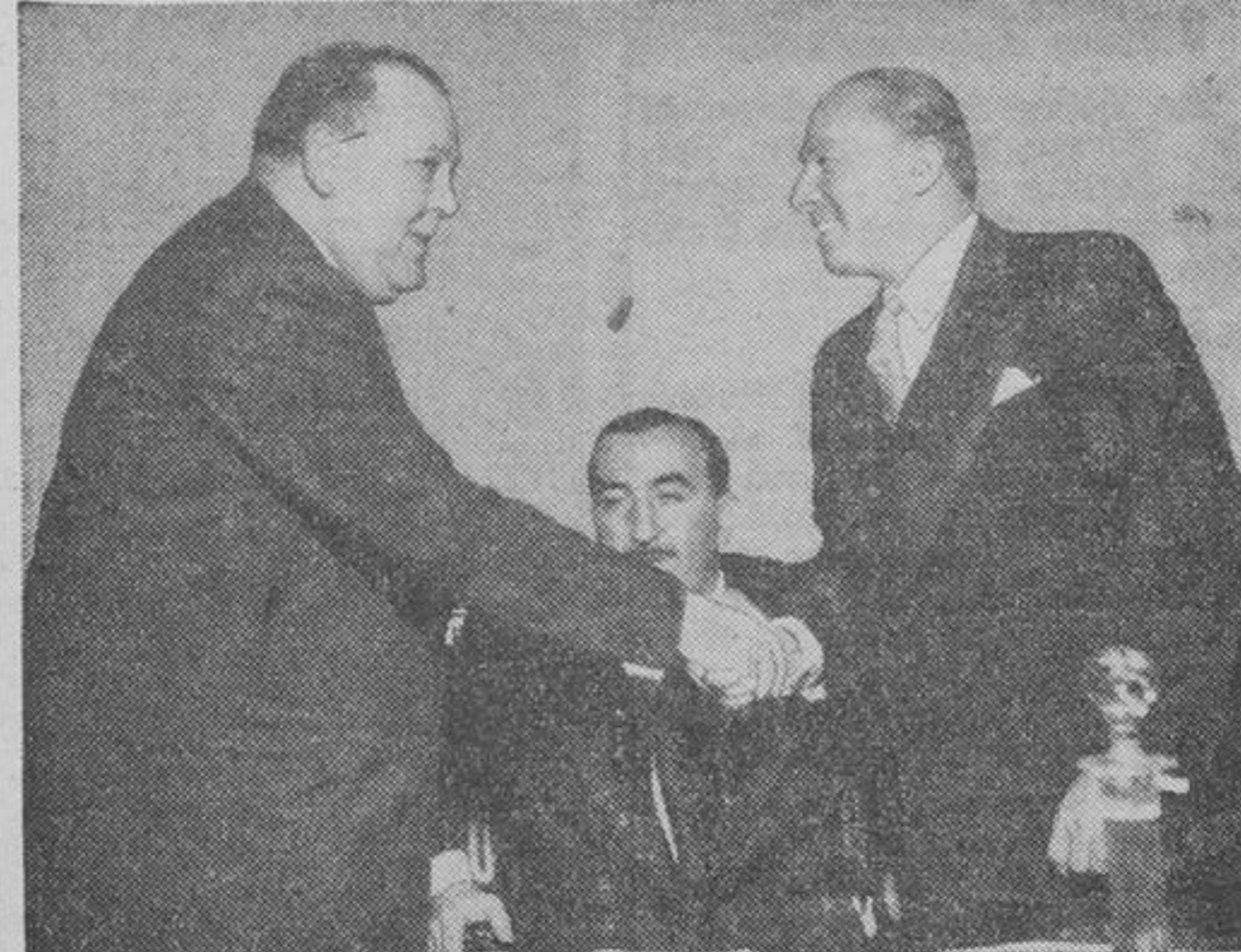
WHAT THEY LEAVE BEHIND

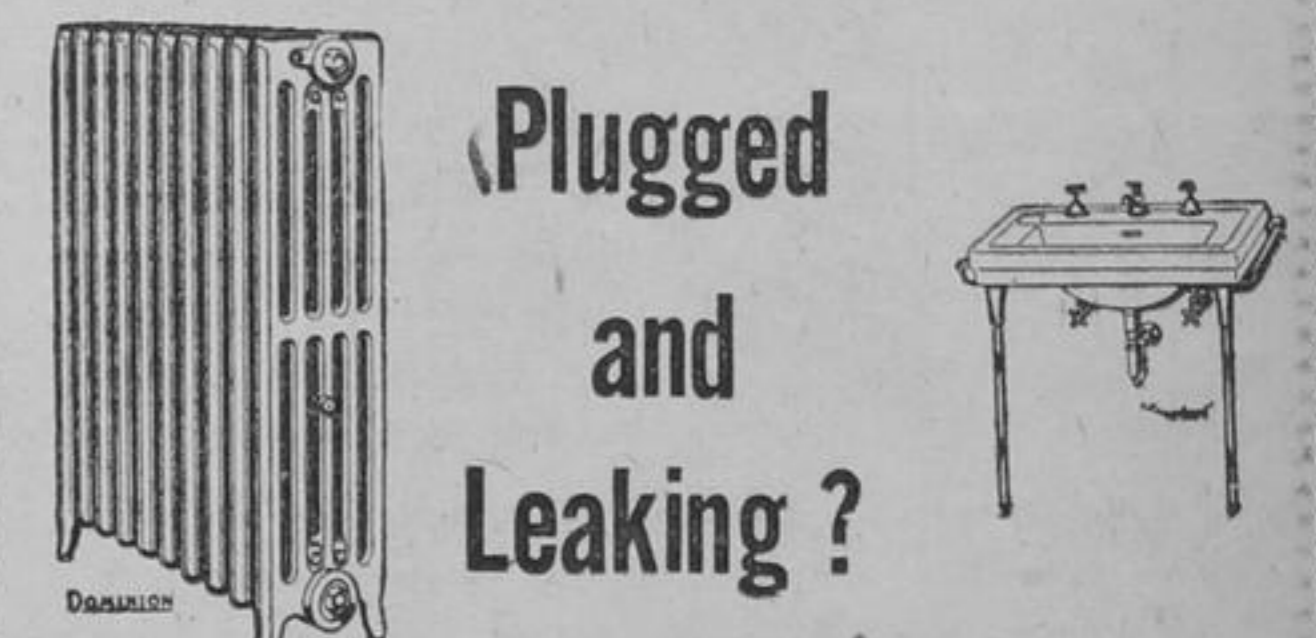

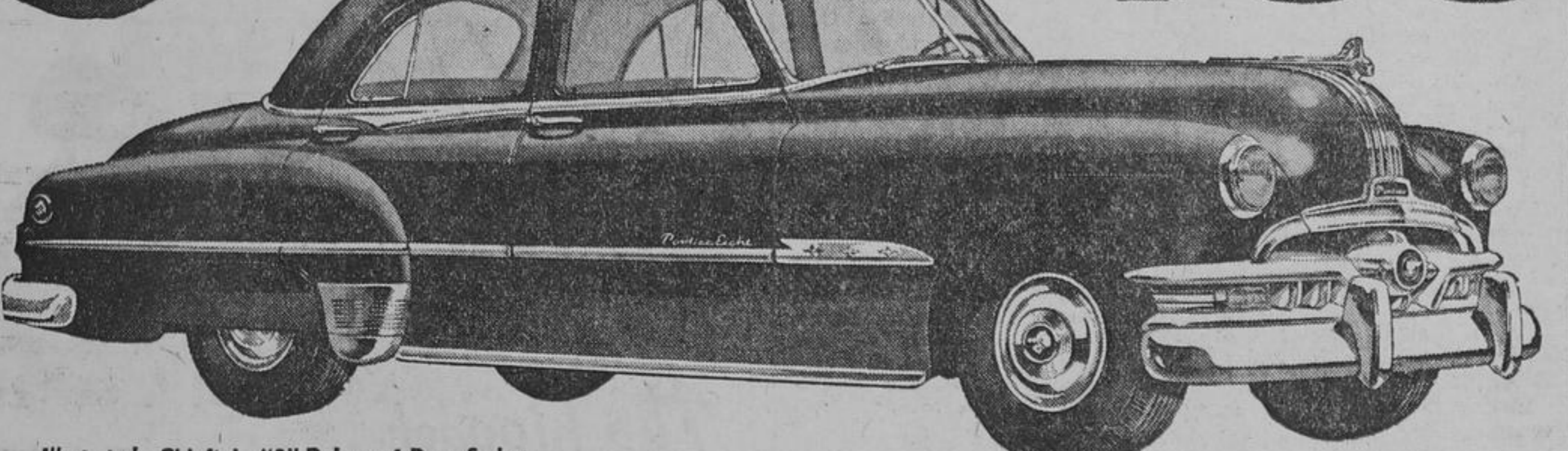

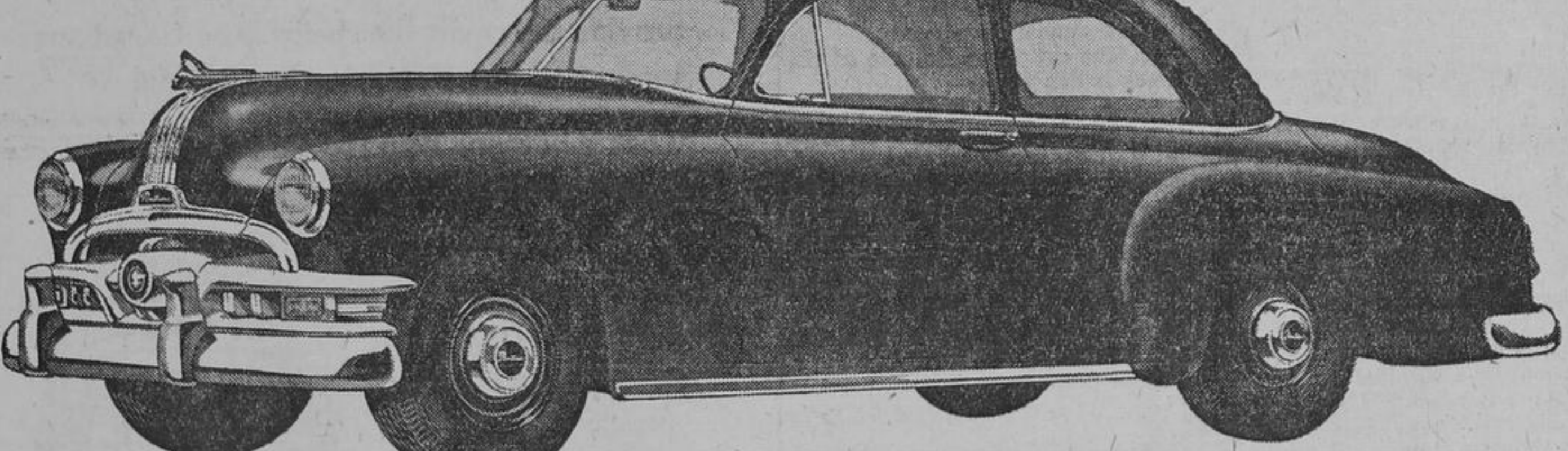
