**Tomato Cheese Salad**

THE star feature at many a summer meal is a salad. One that's well worth starring is a sparkling rosy red salad made with tomato soup.

**TOMATO CHEESE SALAD**  
½ envelope unflavored gelatin  
¼ cup cold water  
1 can (1½ cups) condensed tomato soup  
1 tablespoon lemon juice  
1 tablespoon finely chopped onion  
1 cup (½ pint) cottage cheese

Soften the gelatin in the cold water. Heat the tomato soup in a saucepan; then add the gelatin, stirring until it is completely dissolved in the soup. Mix in the lemon juice. Cool the soup until it begins to thicken; then stir in the chopped onion and chunks of cottage cheese. Pour mixture into 4 individual or 1 medium-size mold. Chill until firm. Unmold on crisp greens. Makes 4 servings.
