Miss Mary Maddocks who is attending the American Airlines Stewardess Training School in Chicago is now nearing the end of the "rugged" course which normally takes five weeks of concentrated effort but has been condensed for her group to three.

Some bad weather on the flight to Chicago, made the trip bumpy in spots. Mary writes home that the dormitories at the school are really attractive and accommodate six girls, her own room-mates being from Mississippi, Texas and Tennessee. "No visitors are allowed in the building and we're really looked after. You also take turns on week-ends being a "house mother", etc., answering the telephone and taking messages as well as the sign 'in' and 'out' sheet."

As the girls have to make 85% average on most subjects for a pass, it is interesting to note how she is doing, learned that on her first papers she made 100 and 94 with 98% average on one subject. On routes and codes they have to make 95 percent "or else." Besides courses in such widely different subjects as meteorology and salesmanship, make-up and hair styles are studied and "H" day is hair-cutting day. There is a full size replica of the inside of a DC6 in the classroom which by the turn of a switch is made to react as it does in real flight. Considerable training takes place in this, including the serving of meals.

In spite of the heavy schedule, there is some time for pleasure which includes a big dinner at the Congress Hotel.

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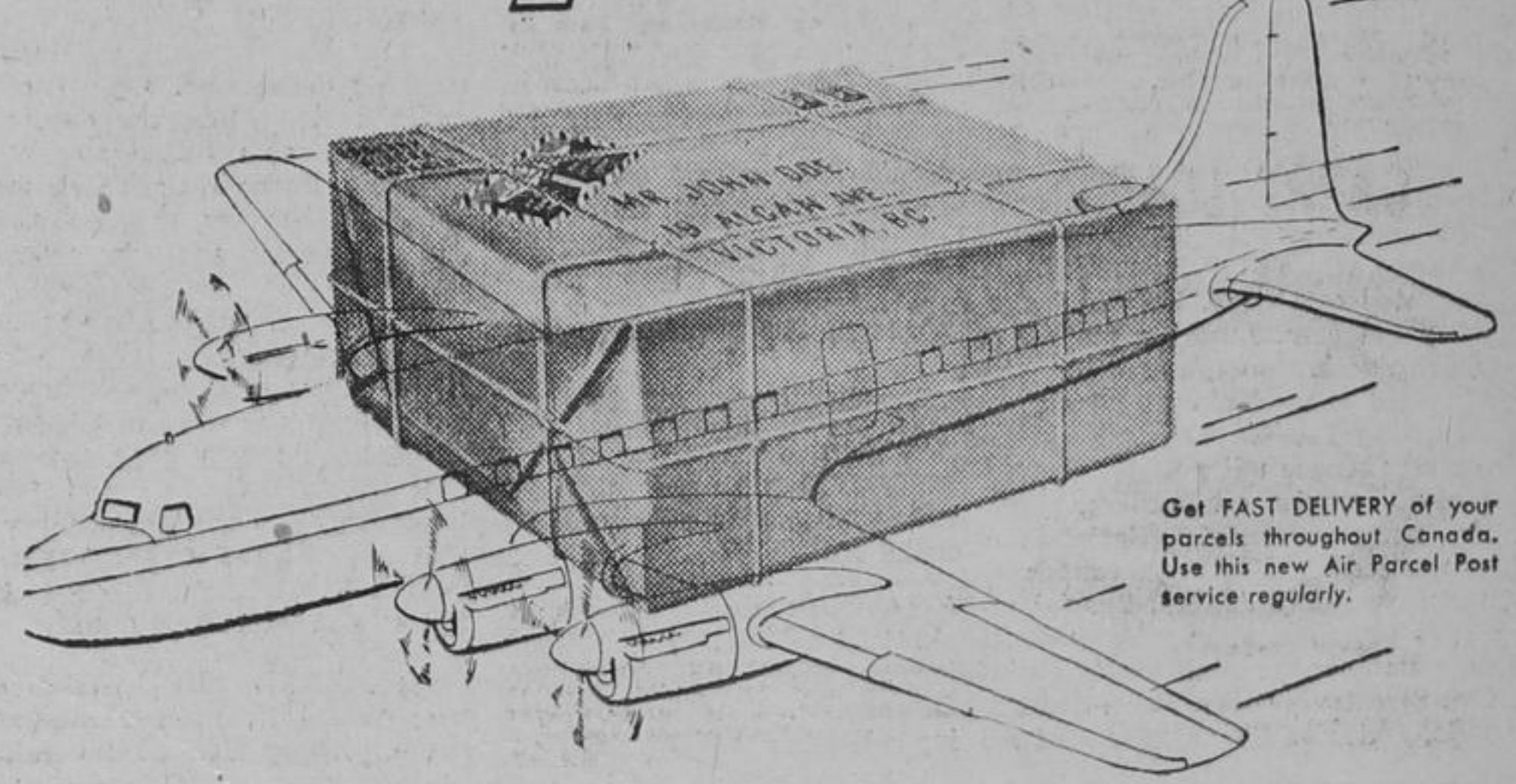
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
