Mr. and Mrs. Syd Broadbelt visited in Acton on Sunday afternoon.

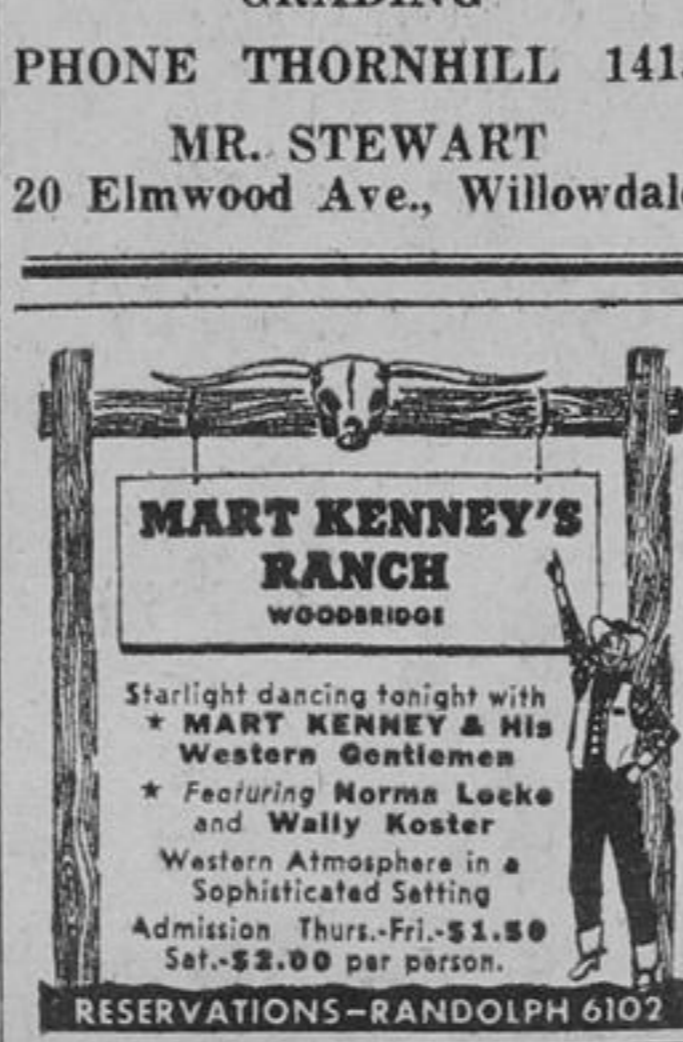
