Pasture Planning Proves Worth On Jack Fraser's Concord Farms

About 500 acres of excellent pastureland and has had his permanent pasture down since 1943. NEWMARKET: Deputy-Reeve J. L. Spilette of Newmarket, a member of County Council for 12 years is highly favoured as the likely choice for 1952 York County Warden.

STOUFFVILLE: A chlorinator will be installed to treat the village water supply on the advice of the Provincial Department of Health.

ALTONA: William Clarkson was an unusual potato patch. Out of many of the potato plants are stems bearing tomatoes. Mr. Clarkson says this happens in his potato patch every year.

NEWMARKET: More than \$1700. has been raised by popular subscription for the installation of floodlights at the ball park. Total cost will be \$2,000.

STOUFFVILLE: George J. Tran celebrated his 96th birthday on Sunday, July 29.

PICKERING: Building continues active in Pickering Township. Permits issued for the month of July amounted to \$144,000, mostly for homes.

NEWMARKET: The third annual Trade Fair opened here Wednesday night and will remain open until Saturday.

SUTTON: The annual Horse Show here attracted large crowds last Friday and Saturday.

LEMONVILLE: In this small community north of Stouffville floodlights for the ball park have been erected and are now operating.

KESWICK: North Gwillimbury council paid \$900. at the last meeting for livestock killed by dogs. This included \$788. for 30 ewes and a number of lambs in one flock; \$50 for 1 sow, and \$44.50 for hens.

WESTERN CANADA: Better than average crops are expected this year, and the total yield may top 500 million bushels according to latest reports.

OTTAWA: Returns indicate a falling off in cigarette sales, the first in many years. Higher cigarette prices are credited with causing the drop. Many have cut down on their use and many more roll their own.

KESWICK: North Gwillimbury Council has passed a by-law banning advertising sound trucks from lakeside resorts.

WILLOWDALE: For the first time in some years building in North York Twp. showed a decline in July compared to the same month a year ago. There were 290 permits issued in July for 394 units valued at more than three million dollars. Although less than last year this is still a very substantial building program.

MARKHAM: The village tax rate for 1951 has been set at 52 mills.

UNIONVILLE: Markham Township council is planning to build a new building to house municipal machinery, and are considering a new office building to take care of expanding township activities.

BRACEBRIDGE: Blueberries are an excellent crop this year. If favorable weather continues pickers in Northern Ontario will take in more than a million dollars to make it the biggest crop in years.

TORONTO: Police have a new candidate for the title of the meanest sneak thief of the year. He is a young hitch hiker who stole \$20. from a U.S.A. war veteran vacationing in Ontario while recuperating from wounds suffered in Korea.

SUTTON: Reeve Charles Scott died here Saturday after an illness of several months. A former member of Toronto police force he was chairman of the County of York Police Committee.
