At Brown's Corners Mrs. Miller was soloist with the beautiful selection "Morning, Noon and Night." Miss Orena Miller was pianist.

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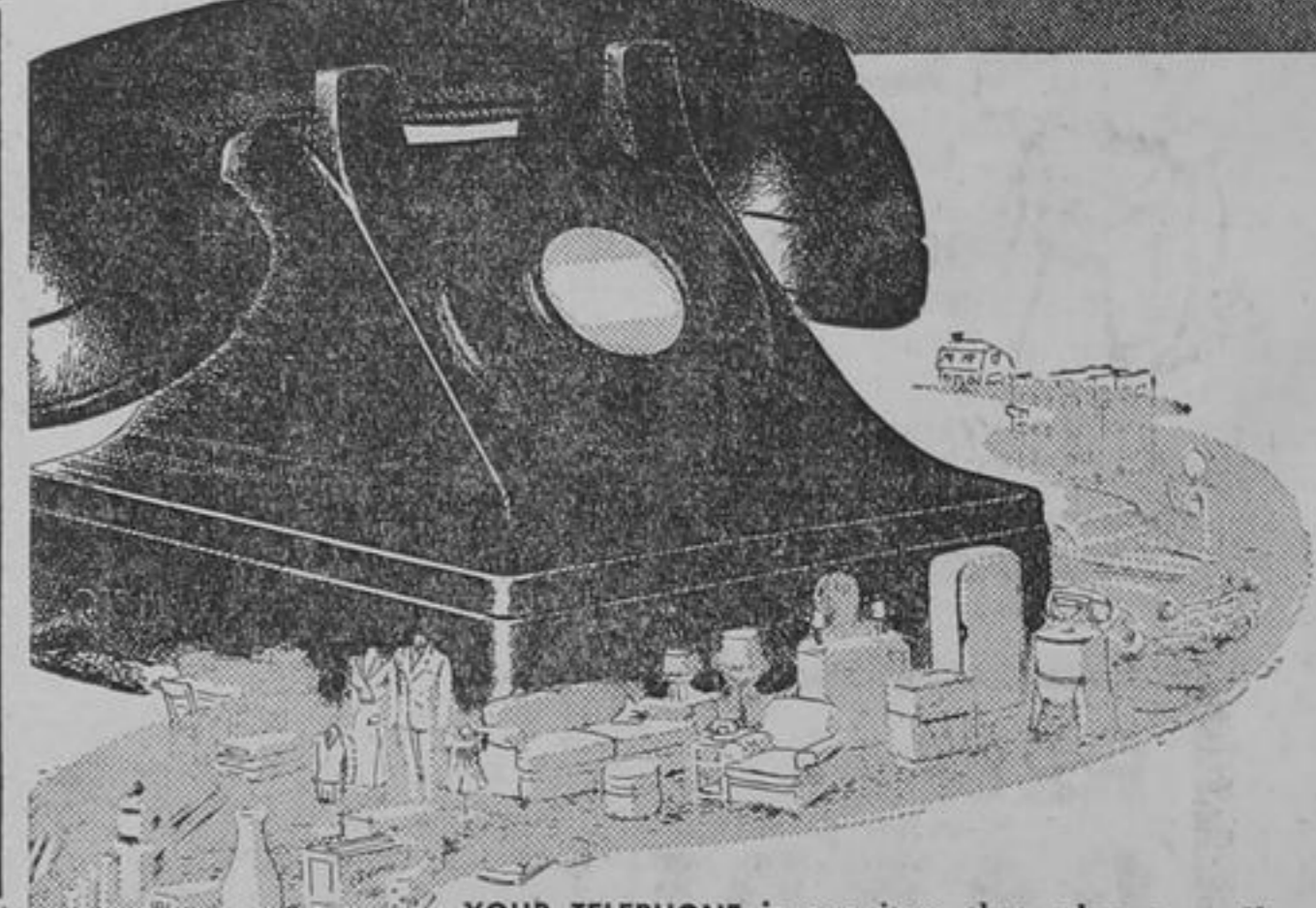

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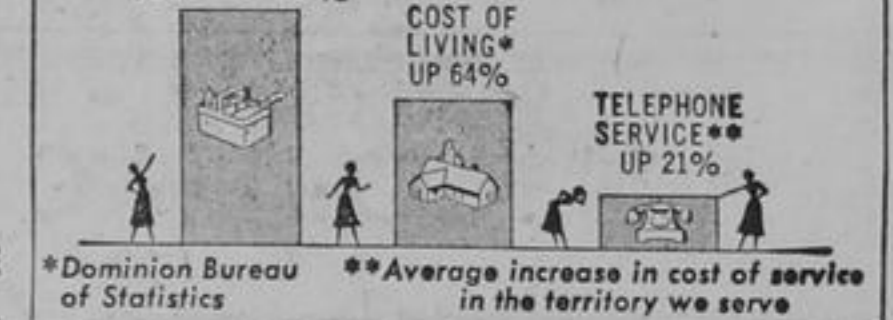
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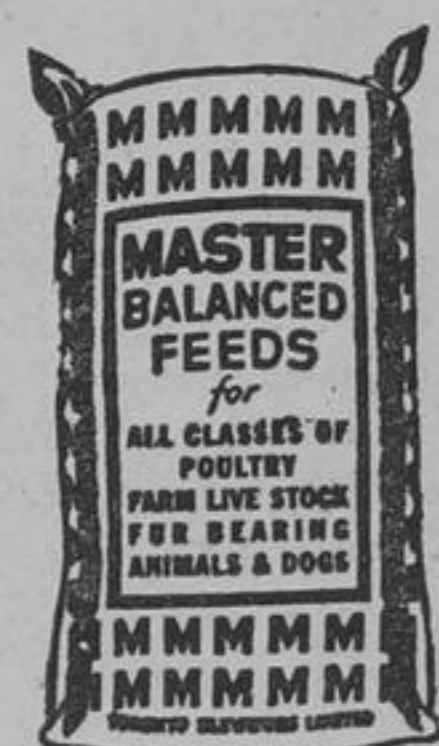
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
