A number of young people in the community attended the Junior Farmers regular meeting in Velloro on Tuesday, August 14 and were privileged to see and hear Mr. Norm Garriock, CBC's popular radio commentator.

About twenty farmers of this district attended the York County Crop Improvement Association meeting on Friday night held on three farms in the Markham and Scarboro districts. They first visited the farm of Harold Coakwell in Markham where they saw in operation a combination of forage harvester, threshing machine, forage blower and self-unloading wagons. With this combination of machines it is possible to harvest an entire crop from swath to grain bin and straw mow in one operation, virtually untouched by human hands and at a great saving in time and labour. What surprised them most was the absence of straw and cracked kernels in the grain bin. They then realized that the time is fast approaching when the pitch fork will become a relic. They were also favorably impressed by the fact that there is great saving in binder twine, time and labour of stooking and loss due to killing of new seedlings by stocks standing too long. The group moved on to the farm of E. A. Creighton of Scarboro where they saw a herd of cattle that had not been out to pasture this summer but were instead fed grass silage. They also inspected a grass silage stack. They then proceeded to the farm of Sam Gough where they saw another forage-harvester, threshing machine set-up. Here the group of about 200 visitors were invited to sit on Mr. Gough's spacious lawns for a discussion period. Mr. W. M. Cockburn, Agricultural Representative for York County opened the discussion period. Mr. Albert Rutherford, president of the York County Crop Improvement Association introduced the speaker, Professor A. Gable, who explained the life-history and control of the Hessian Fly, the insect that this year caused considerable damage to wheat crop in sections of this as well as other districts.
