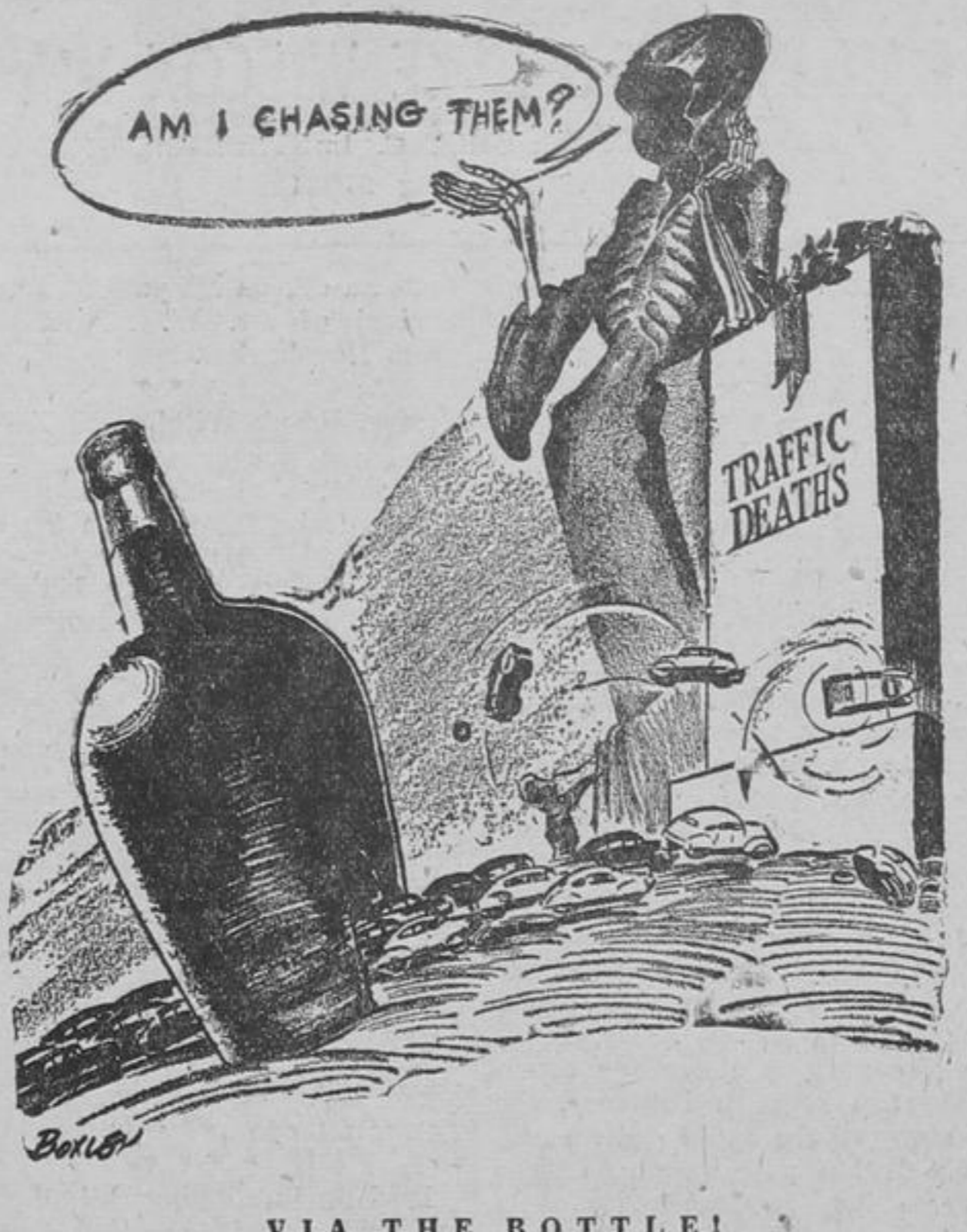

**Schomberg Farm Produces Its 2nd World Champion Holstein**

For the second time within a year the purebred Holstein herd of Cecil Atkinson and his son Glenn of Schomberg, Ont., has produced a World Champion. The new champion is Elsie Texal who has established World records for yearly production of milk and butterfat in the junior three-year-old class on twice-a-day milking. Elsie's official figures are quoted by the Record of Performance branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, under whose supervision the record was made, as 25,920 lbs. milk containing 986 lbs. fat, average test 3.80 percent butterfat. Last December her stablemate Orchard Vale Laura Texal established a World Record for milk in the junior two-year-old class of the yearly division on twice-a-day milking by giving 22,005 lbs. milk and 778 lbs. fat.  
 Both champions are the result of artificial breeding, their dams having been bred to bulls in the Maple Cattle Breeders Unit. Elsie is a daughter of Lonelm Texal Antony and Laura a daughter of Lonelm Texal Ideal, two paternal brothers. Antony has 1472 registered progeny, making him one of the most prolific sires in Canada. The new champion almost missed being registered as a purebred. Her dam was sold while in calf by E. H. Redman, Concord, Ont., to a neighbour Wm. Cooper. As Mr. Cooper did not maintain a purebred herd he was not going to bother having the calf registered when it was born but was persuaded to do so by a friend. Without being registered as a purebred Elsie could not have been placed on official test and so would have missed the opportunity of establishing her World Record. She was purchased by the Atkinsons when just a few months old.  
 Elsie is a persistent milker having produced very evenly throughout her lactation. On her best day she gave 93 lbs. (37 quarts) and during her best month 2679 lbs. She was fed and milked by 22 year-old Glenn Atkinson except for a brief two week period when she was cared for by Bill Allison. The former world championships for milk and fat in this class were also held by Canadian Holsteins, the milk champion being Calamity Fayne Piebe, owned by Jas. A. McKinlay, St. Thomas, Ont. with 24,090 lbs.; and the fat champion, Lifloc Mata Hari Supreme, bred by Norman W. McConkey, Peterboro, Ont., with 905 lbs. fat.

 Bill Crouch of Newmarket was declared winner of the Eaton Hall cup and watch while Harry Bewell of Greenbank was winner of the Simpson silverware.  
 In spite of rain which continued all day over 900 attended the annual Plowing Match conducted under the auspices of the King and Vaughan Plowmen on the farm of C. A. (Tiny) Cathers north-west of Aurora. Although entries show a drop of ten from the previous year's 45, the program was carried through to completion.  
 In spite of a hard day in the rain a large number attended the evening banquet.

**Maple Cattle Assoc. Has Successful Sale**

The Maple Cattle Breeders Association, one of the largest artificial breeding units in Canada, held a very successful sale of animals sired by Unit bulls at the Oakville Sales Arena on October 23. The 57 head sold brought \$27,622 for an average of \$484. Fifteen milking females averaged \$592; 23 bred heifers \$505; 11 open yearlings \$320; and 8 heifer calves \$358. The sale attracted a crowd of over one thousand, one of the largest of recent years.  
 Highest price was \$1100 paid by J. E. Houck, Brampton to Pickering College, Newmarket for P. C. N. Polly Texal, a four-year-old daughter of Lonelm Texal Highcroft.  
 Second highest figure of \$939 was bid by Geo. C. Jackson, Downsview, Ont., for a three year old daughter of Lonelm Texal Pickwick consigned by R. J. Darlington, Maple, Ont.
