The January meeting will be held at the home of Mrs. D. Jarrett, on the second Tuesday instead of the first Tuesday. The topic will be Historical Research.

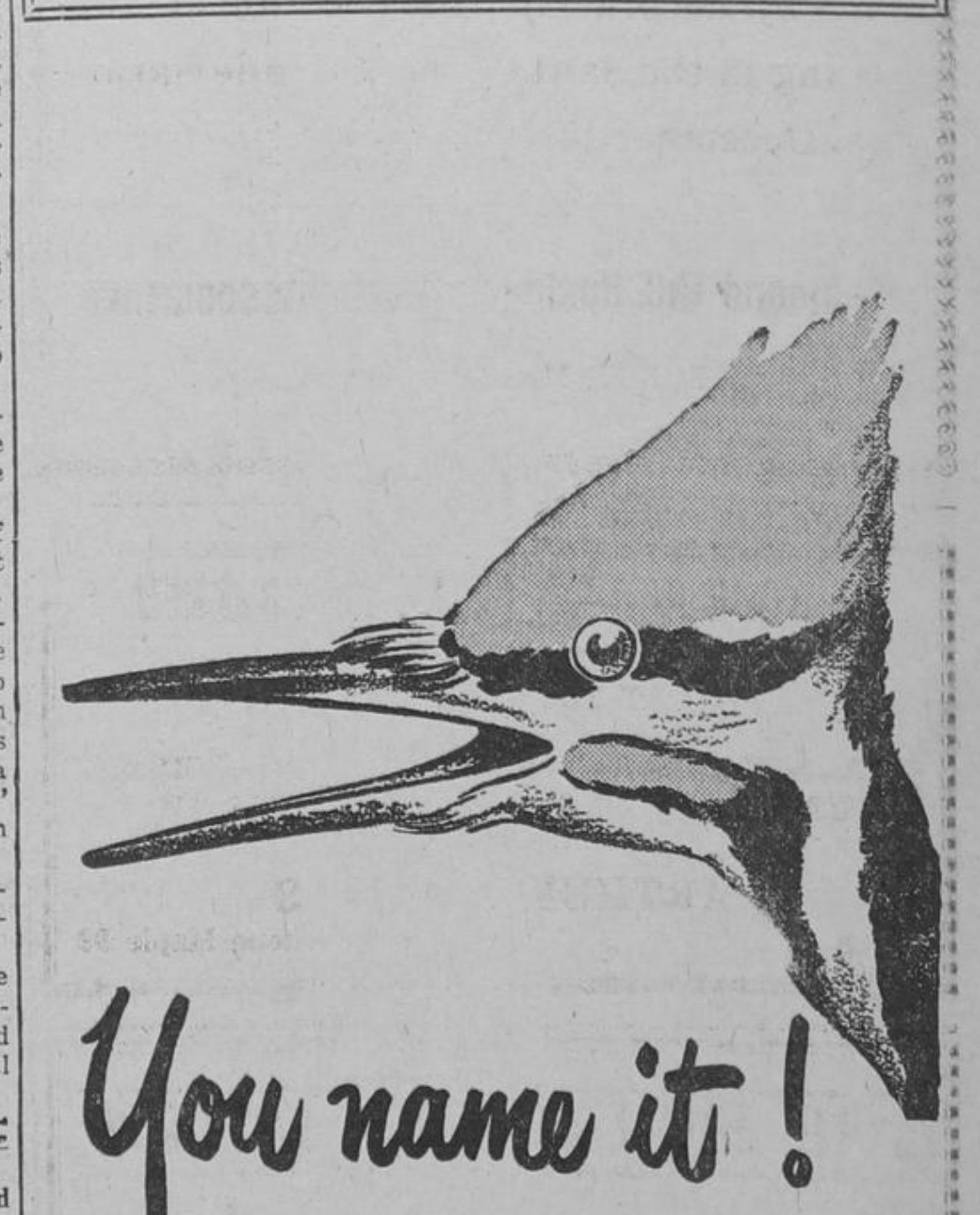
