It is important that ratepayers be fully informed, and there cannot be undue haste in a matter of such far-reaching importance. On other hand there is no justification for any protracted delay. Unneccessary delay oftentimes proves costly. Here in Richmond Hill we had a recent experience with the same Ontario Municipal Board when unnecessary delay did prove costly.

Richmond Hill needs additional area for industrial development. There is ample evidence that opportunities for such industial development exist at the present time. How long such opportunities will remain no one can say. It is a certainty however that industrialists seeking new locations are not going to wait indefinitely for Richmond Hill or any other place to make up its mind whether or not it is going to be in a position to offer land and adequate services.
