ELECTRICAL TIPS FOR THE HOME

If Your Bathroom Light Casts Annoying Shadows and Glare...



DON'T think you have to center one fixture over the bathroom mirror. A lamp placed in this position casts shadows on the neck and chin, makes shaving and other close-seeing jobs difficult.

DO install two fluorescent or incandescent fixtures—one on each side of the mirror. For shadowless, glare-free light, center the lamps at 5 feet, 2 inches high and cover them with translucent shades.

Red & Yellow Sticker Shows Vehicle License

The autoist who always keeps a clean license plate will still have a clean license plate throughout 1952 when his neighbor, with a rusted or bent plate will be driving in fear of a police charge for illegible markers with the starting of sale of the new 1952 "Windshield Stickers" instead of new metal plates.

The 1952 Ontario vehicle license is merely a 3-by-5 inch sticker to prove payment of license fees while continuing to use the 1951 license plates. The windshield sticker is to be placed on the inside of the windshield at the lower right corner.

Motorcycles and trailers have to be issued with new metal plates, as there is no windshield spot for use of a sticker.

The new Ontario Department of Highways plan is introduced at the behest of the Canadian Government to conserve steel which went into the hundreds of thousands of plates.

Toward the end of a second year's use of the plates bought in January of 1951, the plates will be showing effect of ordinary weather plus the corrosion from road sand and salt. The 1951 plates must be in good condition, else if they are defaced in any way, the owner must buy a new set and pay an extra \$1.00 as well as purchasing the windshield stamp. It is a traffic offence to have defaced, dirty or obstructed markers with a fine of \$5.00 to \$50.00 upon a conviction.

Car owners are warned not to lose the 1952 stickers, possibly from inside frost and steam of changeable temperature. If lost, replacement cost is a further \$1.00 and a form must be filled out with the signature of a Commissioner of oaths or a Justice of Peace.

Passenger license cost is from as low as \$2.00 for a 4-cylinder car to \$35 for a 16-cylinder car. Commercial vehicle licences range from a low of \$7.50 to a high of \$148.50.

Markham Council To Consider Annexation

The Markham Council will hold a special meeting at 7 o'clock Friday evening in the Council Chambers, Unionville, to consider the two important questions of annexation and the appointing of a Planning Board. At their regular meeting on Monday evening Clerk Hoover read a letter from the Richmond Hill Council in which Markham was asked to tabulate its policy regarding the proposed annexation.

Maplewood Farms Import Guernseys

Maplewood Farms Ltd., Maple, Ont., owned by John M. Glenn, have recently imported thirty-five purebred Guernseys from the United States purchased at the Ben Tulloch dispersal at Millbrook, New York and from McDonald farms, Cortland, New York. The selections made at Ben Tulloch carry a preponderance of McDonald Farms breeding and are closely related to the McDonald Farms group, carrying the breeding of McDonald Foremost Prediction, a son of Douglaston Lady Augusta, who has three excellent daughters, McDonald Farms Prediction, McDonald Farms Steadfast, Myhaven King and McDonald Farms Ideal which are all represented. Senior herd sire purchased is McDonald Farms Juvenile by Distinction. Of special interest is the purchase of McDonald Farms High Rue, the first heifer calf by McDonald Farms High Financier by High-time, who was offered as choice with his full brother High Noble Peer, who sold at a world's record price of \$21,000. Maplewood Farm is managed by Peter Tilley. Cy Canning and John Coff are in charge of the herd.

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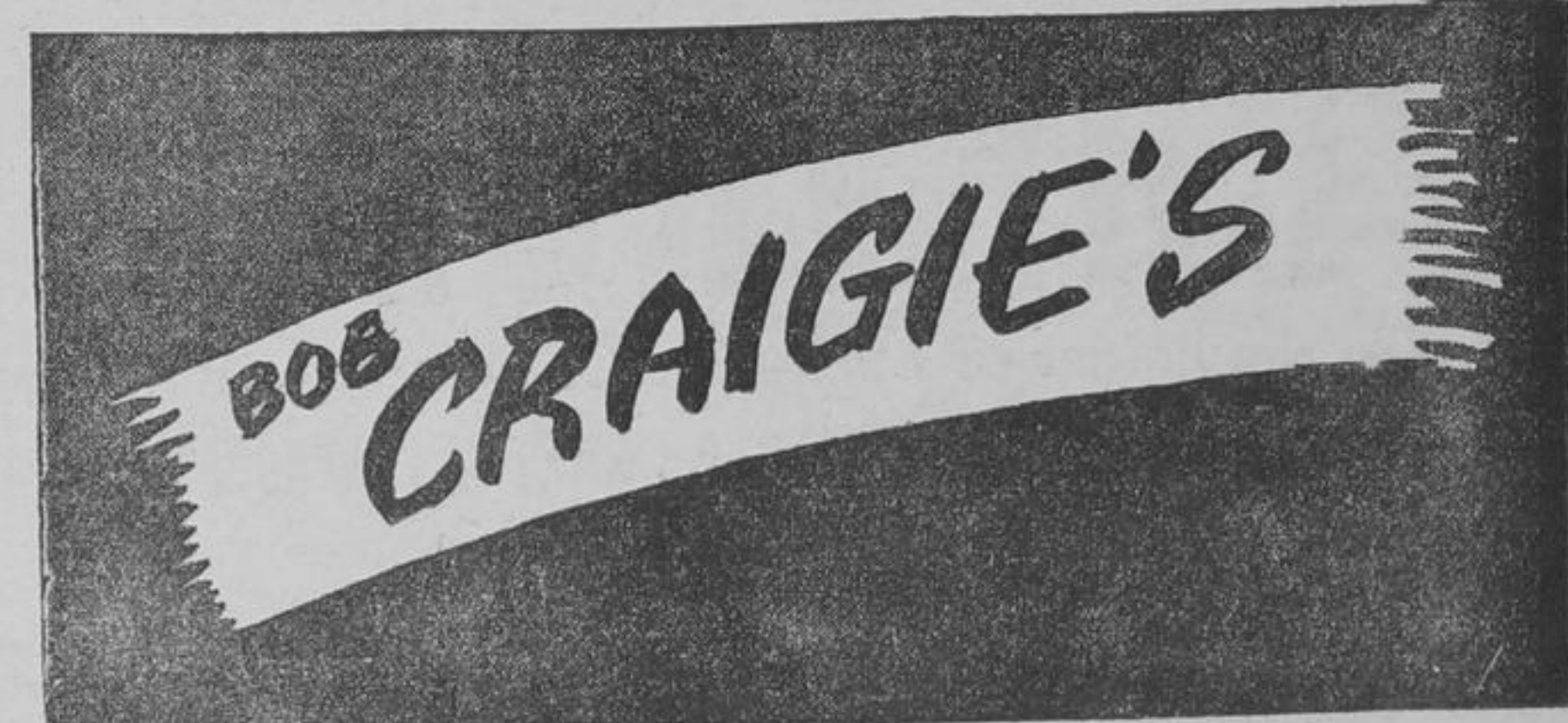
