Richvale Home and School On Tuesday, January 29, in the school, the Richvale Home and School Association held its inaugural meeting with Mrs. H. E. LeMasurier, vice-president of the North Area Home & School Council of the York District, presiding. Mr. Jackson Taylor, secretary for the meeting introduced Mr. Keith Richan, chairman of the Board of Trustees for the School Area. In his opening remarks, Mr. Richan said that he welcomed the opportunity of being present at the inaugural meeting of the Richvale Home and School Association, and the opportunity of saying a few words informally regarding the value to the community of its formation. He felt the Richvale area should be congratulated on taking this step because a Home and School Association can do much to develop and improve understanding between parents and teachers. There are many problems which arise during a child's period of attendance at public school and since the motivating force behind Home and School Associations is a basic interest in the child, this group is accepting a great challenge. Mr. Richan also thought the Association will prove to be, as others have, an excellent medium through which certain conditions and problems which might need attention can be brought to the attention of the community and either directly or indirectly to the Board of Trustees. Mr. Richan cautioned against unnecessary criticism. Good criticism has its place, but it should be of a constructive and not destructive nature," he said. Great emphasis should be placed on the planning of the association's programme each year. The nature of the programme will govern the interest taken by the membership and if it is well balanced and designed primarily to develop interest in problems of the Home and School as they effect the children much will be accomplished for the community at large.
